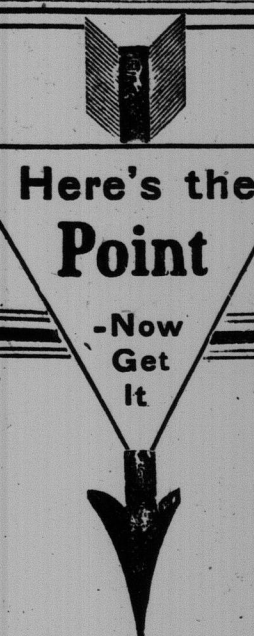

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Morning Stock Letter

NEW YORK, March 16.—The stock market was severely sold yesterday, but stood well up. Professional pressure and rumors of a big reaction were the main reasons for the selling movement. A great part of the selling seemed to be for short account, and when stocks rallied the shorts had a hard time covering. The market looks as if it were still in a rallying period, and, subject to considerable irregularity, we believe a good many issues will see higher prices. If a big reaction were coming, we believe it would have come yesterday, but at no time was important liquidation started. The feature at the close was the oil. There are several important mergers in the oil industry. Phillips Petroleum, in our opinion, is one of the best speculations in the oil group. On the improvement in the steel industry we think the steel stocks will sell higher. Similarly the large earnings in the auto field will raise some of the makers still higher. In this group, G.M. seems the best.

BEATTY DENIES C. P. ANXIOUS TO TAKE OVER C.N.R.

Tells Belief In Rivalry As Spur To Efficiency In Montreal Speech

ROAD WILL DEVELOP AS NATION EXPANDS

State Proprietorship Isn't Favored But Will Get Square Deal

MONTREAL, March 15.—E. W. Beatty, chairman and president of the Canadian Pacific, addressing the Canadian Club here today, made an important contribution to public understanding of the Canadian railway situation in that he outlined more clearly than he has yet publicly done the position taken by the Canadian Pacific and its executive head towards the general situation and the publicly owned railways of Canada.

While frankly stating his lack of faith in the principle of public ownership, Mr. Beatty said that the Canadian Pacific was not now, and never had been anxious to take over the other system's lines or any part of them and that the Canadian Pacific was in no way chargeable with desire or act to injure the publicly owned railways; that his company had met them only with fair competition and proposed to continue along such constructive lines, developing its facilities and business as the growth and development of Canada required. Mr. Beatty voiced his belief in competition as a spur to efficiency and that he did not now see the advisability of a railway monopoly for this country whatever might happen in the future.

REVIEWS RAIL HISTORY.

In his opening remarks Mr. Beatty reviewed Canada's railway history up to the time of the formation of the publicly owned company. It was 60 years since the provinces of Canada decided to unite in Confederation and 40 since the railway which made Confederation possible was complete. Even then the property of governments undertaking and administering such projects or whether they should be privately owned and administered was a debatable subject. The Canadian Pacific accepted from the state amounts which appear very moderate when compared with those since granted special aid in aid of subsequent enterprises. Both methods were tried and construction by the government failed, while that by private enterprise in this instance succeeded.

DEATH REMOVES AN OLD RAILWAY MAN

George Milne Had Been in Harness Continuously Since 1869

Another link in the chain of railway history was snapped with the death of George Milne at the General Public Hospital yesterday afternoon.

The late Mr. Milne was a railway engineer for 45 years. He entered upon his railway career in the days of the old wood burning locomotives and helped ballast the present line between Saint John and West Saint John. Mr. Milne was in the prime of life in the days of Intercolonial railway and after its absorption into the Canadian National Railways he continued in the service of the new system.

He retired from active service in 1912, after having been in harness continuously since 1869. During his engineering days he covered all the runs over the I. C. R. and C. N. R. out of Saint John. For many years he was on the Maritime Express. He was widely known throughout the province especially among railroad men.

The late Mr. Milne was a member of Union Lodge No. 2, Knights of Pythias, and Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers No. 62, Moncton.

Mr. Milne is survived by his wife, four sons, George, Arthur and James, of Saint John, and Roy, of Boston; one daughter, Mrs. F. Armstrong, two step-daughters, Mrs. Auril Duffy and Mrs. A. Lunnigan; six grandchildren, three brothers, Frank and William, of Boston, and Bruce, of Calgary; four sisters, Mrs. H. C. Charters, Moncton; Mrs. John Ruske, of Saint John; Mrs. James McCleave, of Moncton, and Miss Jessie Milne, of Boston.

The funeral will take place on Wednesday with private service at the home, 82 Watson street, West Saint John, at 2 p.m. and service at St. George's church at 2:30.

New Zealand Star Wants Nurmi Race
