

MULTIPLICATION OF THE REINDEER
(Philadelphia Ledger).
The United States Department of the Interior announces that there are 250,000 reindeer in Alaska, the value of which is approximately \$6,250,000. Less than 35 years ago Alaska did not have a single reindeer. Today the Eskimos in that country find this animal their principal source of income. It keeps them well supplied with food. The policy of the Government in sending reindeer to Alaska was a wise one. Thousands of Eskimos live there, and it is estimated that the value of the Eskimos' greatest problem.
