MULTIPLICATION OF THE REINDEER
(Philadelphia Ledger).
The United States Department of the Interior announces that there are 250,000 reindeer in Alaska, the value of which is approximately \$6,250,000. Less than 35 years ago Alaska did not have a single reindeer. Today the Eskimos in that country find this animal their principal source of income. It keeps them well supplied with food. The policy of the Government in sending reindeer to Alaska was a wise one. Thousands of Eskimos live there, and it is estimated that the value of the reindeer owned by them is more than \$4,000,000.

When the Government's commission went into the country to study conditions and suggest the proper kind of relief for the inhabitants, a report was submitted to the effect that in the reindeer lay the true answer to the Eskimos' greatest problem. In 1892 about a hundred of the animals were purchased, and so rapid has been the numerical growth of the herds that they have become a most valuable asset. From poverty stricken wards of the nation the Eskimos have developed into independent citizens worth on an average several hundred dollars each.
