MAY SUMMON MINISTER TO BAR OF HOUSE

Alleged Statements About Race Track Bill

Premier Borden Brings Up Report of Alleged Remarks by Rev. Dr. Speer in Toronto—Latter's Reply Disclaims Reflection on Parliament.

(Canadian Press.)
Ottawa, June 15.—The first step to be taken as the result of discussion in the House of Commons on reported statements in Toronto by Rev. Dr. Speer about race track interests who sought to bring about the passage of the amendments to the criminal code, has been taken in a telegraphic demand by Speaker Rhodes that Rev. Dr. Speer state by telegraph whether or not he was correctly reported in the newspaper item.

Should Rev. Dr. Speer admit that the report as published was correct, it is expected the next step will likely be a summons for him to appear before the Bar of the House and there explain what information he had on which to base his statement, which caused an outbreak of indignation in the Commons yesterday.

In the telegram sent him Rev. Dr. Speer is asked if he denies the statement attributed to him, to state to the Speaker what he said in Toronto.

The House Statements.
Sir Robert Borden said that his attention had been drawn to a despatch from Toronto which quoted Rev. Dr. Speer, of the Methodist Conference in Toronto, as saying that money was used in the lobby of the parliament buildings in connection with the recent race track legislation. Dr. Speer was quoted as saying that it was a foregone conclusion that the race track men would get what they wanted.

If the reverend gentleman was correctly reported, said the prime minister, his statement would appear to consti-

tute "the most outrageous and scandalous libel." Speaking for himself, he had not seen a race track man in the lobbies, and had not heard of one being there. It was his firm conviction that the statements made in the item were absolutely false.

The statements attributed to Rev. Dr. Speer would, said Sir Robert Borden, had felt it his duty to bring it before the members of the House, and he proposed to ask Mr. Speaker to consider what

action would appropriately be taken in the matter.

Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King, leader of the opposition, joined with the prime minister in his attitude. He expressed the greatest hope that the despatch was incorrect.

Speaker Rhodes said that the despatch certainly called for some action, and he would take into consideration what would be the best course to pursue. Such remarks would have the tendency to sap and undermine the position of parliament.

Jacques Boreau of Three Rivers, remarked that in his view such a slanderous lie had best be ignored. It would be honoring the man who made it too much if he were called to answer before the bar of the House.

Dr. Speer's Reply.
Toronto, June 15.—"There was nothing in my statement that would cast any shadow of reflection upon the integrity and honor of any member of parliament," said Rev. Dr. Speer. "I have made this plain to Speaker Rhodes in a wire that I sent him last night. My remarks were made in reply to a man on the platform who berated the Methodist church for not having sent letters to members of parliament in respect to race track gambling."

"I replied that letters were of no use whatever, as it was a foregone conclusion that after the war some new legislation would be enacted in respect to this matter. I further stated that the Methodist church had no money to spend to send or keep deputations at Ottawa. My use of the word 'lobby' was not used in a way to cast reproach upon the honesty of any member of parliament, but was used to convey an impression that the race track people had money for lobbying, if necessary."
