

down the bay the large C. P. O. S. liner Metagama came salling into the harbor at an early hour this morning and docked at No. 3 berth, Sand Point. She had one of the best passages since the season opened and her large number of passengers were delighted with the trip across the Atlantic. There was not a word of complaint heard on any side and one and all were unanimous in the statement that it was a most enjoyable trip and the service, food, etc., were all that could be desired.

The large liner had on board 1,530 passengers, including 366 in a military party, 305 children and the remaining soldiers' dependents. There were 514 cabin passengers and 1,016 steerage. The vessel sailed from Liverpool on March 15 and made the passage in eight days. There was only one case of sickness during the voyage, a case of influenza, which developed into pneumonia, but aside from this there was nothing to mar the pleasures of the trip.


