METAGAMA IN; NOTABLES ABOARD

Brigadier Generals Among Those Landing At Sand Point

AN EXCELLENT VOYAGE

Only One Case of Sickness Reported—Some 366 Soldiers and More Than 1,000 Others—St. John Men Among the Number

With the sun breaking over the hills in the east and a light wind blowing down the bay the large C. P. O. S. liner Metagama came sailing into the harbor at an early hour this morning and tied up at No. 8 berth, Sand Point. She had one of the best passages since the season opened and her large number of passengers were delighted with the trip across the Atlantic. There was not a word of complaint heard on any side and all were unanimous in the statement that it was a most enjoyable trip and the service, food, etc., were all that could be desired.

The large liner had on board 1,350 passengers, including 366 in a military party, 385 children and the remaining soldiers' dependents. There were 616 cabin passengers and 1,016 steerage. The vessel sailed from Liverpool on March 15 and made the passage in eight days. There was only one case of sickness during the voyage, a case of influenza which developed into pneumonia and was carried on board from the ship. The pleasure of the trip.

Lieut.-Colonel Francis Hillery MacD. Coakley of Winnipeg.
Lieut.-Colonel John Houston of Ottawa.
Lieut.-Colonel Albert William Winnett of Kingston, Ont.
Lieut.-Colonel Hume Blake of Toronto.

Brigadier-General MacLaren, D. S. O. and C. M. G., crossed overseas with the 2nd Battalion of the first Canadian contingent and sailed from Quebec on the S. S. Saxonia. He was then a major, but after six months' service in France was promoted to the rank of lieutenant-colonel and placed in command of the first brigade of the first Canadian division. He remained in command until 1916, when his great work was recognized and he was promoted to be a brigadier-general and given command of the entire first division.

Brigadier-General Hewey is well known in this city as well as all over the Dominion. He is one of the most notable railroad constructors in Canada and his ability in this line won for him rapid promotion. He crossed overseas as a major in a Canadian railway troop unit and after a brief stay in France was promoted to be lieutenant-colonel and given command of the 4th Canadian railway troops. He left that unit in June, 1918, and was promoted to his present rank and recalled to England on special service.

He was a director of the Courtenay Bay Construction Company and it was under his supervision that the Courtenay Bay breakwater was built. He was quite surprised to learn that the work had not progressed more rapidly since he completed his part of the contract. He also was in charge of considerable grading work for the Canadian Pacific Railway in this district.

Major McLean went over in 1915 as squadron commander with the 9th C. M. R. When the 9th was broken up he was sent to 4th C. M. R. and has seen much active service. He was invalided home in November, 1917, and spent a few months here before returning to his unit.
