HOUSING REFORM

The housing problem in St. John must be seriously grappled with at once. The generosity of New Brunswick lumberbe seriously grappled with at once. The partial housing survey that has been made shows very undesirable conditions in some of the old houses which are at present occupied, and shows also that there is some congestion, which will tend to increase, because the population of the city will grow and the demand for accommodation will continually become greater. The number of new buildings being erected by private enterprise is not and will not be large enough to meet the demand, and many of these houses are not of a charmany of these houses are not of a character to meet the demand for workingmen's homes at a moderate rental.

Consider some of the statements submitted by Mr. Burditt at Thursday night's meeting of the Community Council. In the area between Brussels street and St. Patrick street from Union street to Haymarket Square there are sixty houses without proper sanitary conveniences. It was found that in forty cases one room was used as kitchen, living and sleeping room. One four story house contains eight families, totalling fifty-two people, and it earns a rental of \$862 per year. It is a wooden house of cheap construction. Another house two stories high, sheltering several families, yields a rental of \$420 per year, and Mr. Burditt says it is not fit for human habitation. While it may be true, therefore, that this area on the whole is not congested, and that there are many one and two family houses; yet there are some conditions very undesirable, and there are quite a number of rear houses which, being on low ground, cannot well be in a sanitary condition. show the urgent need for improvement.

The work of the Community Council has only begun. The majority of the citizens would no doubt object to the city entering into the business of constructing houses. There would be no structing houses. We have an illustration in regard to the streets of what may happen. The policy of last year's city council is practically reversed by the council of this year. It is extremely doubtful, moreover, and indeed highly improbable, that the city could get buildings constructed as cheaply as they would be constructed by a building

company or commission.

It is possible, however, under the new housing law for the city to guarantee 85 per cent of the bonds of a company or commission, provided the people vote in favor of that course. That they would do so admits of little doubt, a would do so admits of little doubt, as it is quite apparent the work which ought to be done cannot be carried out successfully without municipal aid..

Two things therefore are needed. One is to develop a public sentiment which will ensure action by the city council



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
