A SMART SLEEVE EFFECT.

To make this waist requires 3 yards of 44-inch or 3½ yards of 36-inch material. If the batiste is 30 inches wide ¼ yard will be sufficient for the trimmings.

First fold the crepe before arranging the pattern parts upon it; then along the lengthwise fold place the back and back belt sections. On a lengthwise thread arrange the outer front, front belt section and collar, sleeve and cuff. Make and fit the lining; then place the outside front, creasing on slot perforations, after which the folded edge is brought to small "O" perforations and stitched. Close under-arm and shoulder seams; gather lower edge and join belt sections as notched. Close center-back seam of collar indicated by single large "O" perforation. Sew vest, collar and belt to front and back, notches and center-backs even, and bring seam of belt to under-arm seam. Roll collar as illustrated. Center-front is lined by large "O" perforations in vest. Arrange on lining, centers and under-arm seams even; stitch lower edge of outer front and back along lower edge of lining.

HAVE YOU A NEEDLE
ECONOMY HINTS FOR THE HOUSEWIFE

If I had a dozen sons I'd dress every one of them in Norfolk suits.

The Norfolk is the only suit that looks well on all boys—the thin boy, the chubby boy, the boy that's "overgrown"—all look well in Norfolk.

Fortunately for the mother who is pondering on ways to keep her boys neatly dressed despite the advanced price of clothing, the Norfolk is easily made at home.

If she has just a little time to give to the task, they can make pretty linen, and even flannel or serge suits that will keep their shape and color through repeated tubbing.

Setting the Overhand Patch.

Herewith I give directions for setting the overhand patch.

Figure 1.

1.—To Cut the Patch
1.—Cut the 6-12 inch square with a stripe on each edge.
2.—Cut a hole in the center four inches square, having a stripe on each edge of this also.
3.—If the checks of your material are small, cut the patch four squares larger than the hole; if they are large, cut it two squares larger; have a stripe on each edge.

II.—To Set in the Patch.
1.—Cut the corners of the hole in diagonally 1-4 inch. (Fig. 1)
2.—Cut the corners of the patch off diagonally a little less than two small squares. (Fig. 2)
3.—Lay the patch on the hole to see which way it must be laid to match perfectly. Be sure that the warp threads run the same way.
4.—Turn back one edge of the patch two squares.
5.—Turn back the same width on the edge of the hole that this turned edge of the patch matches.
6.—Hold the material with the wrong side toward you, and the turned back edge of the hole at the top.
7.—Turn over from you the upper part of the material down to the hole. Do not crease, but hold it in place between the thumb and first finger of the left hand.
8.—Hold the patch with the wrong side toward you and place it over the hole so that the two turned edges lie together.
9.—Push the patch to the material along its side about 3-16 of an inch from the edge. Be careful that your checks match exactly.
10.—Overhand the two edges together, being careful to sew exactly to each corner.
11.—Pull out the basting.
12.—Turn back the next edge of the square and of the patch in the same way you did this one.
13.—Baste the two edges together, and overhand.

"TOMMY" AS A PRISONER
Good Natured and Willing to Work, Says Berlin Observer.

The daily life of the British war prisoners at work in the concentration camp at Dohert's, the large open drill ground of Prussian troops twenty miles from Berlin, is described in a recent issue of the Vossische Zeitung received here. "Tommy," according to the German newspaper, shows no ill-feeling whatever toward his Prussian guards, and works well.

"He cultivates the land in the neighborhood under Prussian direction. He repairs the roads, works in the fields, pulls up weeds in the stretches laid out as gardens, and levels the ground where necessary. It is prisoner's work, but not slave's work, that he does, and everything is done quietly and good-naturedly. One hears no bad or angry word, no summons to be more diligent, and one notices no unfriendly glances. Often enough the German Landwehrman superintending the party shows how things must be done by taking the tools into his own hands; and Tommy is quite willing to learn. He even takes pains with his work. Many of the men come from the country and love the soil. Each gang is in charge of one of its own non-commissioned officers, and is superintended by a man of the Prussian Landwehr. Only the rank and file work; the non-commissioned officers, who, according to military prescriptions, cannot be required to work, stand about smoking cigarettes. Communication between the English and the Germans is carried on by signs for not one of the 8,000 Englishmen at Dohert's either speaks or understands a word of German."

Electrical Storm
A severe electrical storm visited the city last night and continued from about 8.30 to 10 o'clock. A very heavy rainfall and the streets were practically deluged all evening. A fine alarm box in Gilbert's Lane was struck and sounded intermittently during the night. A house owned by Frank Shannon in Wright street was struck and also a barn in Goodrich street but little damage was done in either place.
