\$100,000 for Red Cross.

Chicago, Feb. 5.—More than \$100,000
probably will be turned over to the
American Red Cross by the two major
leagues this season if plans now under
consideration are carried out, President
Ban Johnson of the American League
announced tonight.

It is proposed to increase the cost of
all admissions five or ten cents and turn
over to the Red Cross the difference be-
tween the regular fee plus war tax and
the increased admission price. Club
owners in both leagues favor the pro-
posal and all that remains is official sanc-
tion by Washington officials, Mr. John-
son stated.

"Under this plan," he said, "bleacher
seats would cost 30 cents, pavilion 55
cents, grandstand 80 cents and boxes
\$1.10. Thus on each ticket there would
be two or three cents left over after we
paid the war tax. This would be turned
over to the Red Cross and the total

for the season, based on last season's
figures, would amount to more than
\$100,000.

"The plan now is being considered by
the internal revenue department, and, I
understand, has met with their ap-
proval."
