THE KING'S VALET

England's Monarch, His Wardrobe and the Man in Charge

His Majesty has three valets—a chief and two assistant valets, says London Answers.

The chief valet has been with His Majesty for the last twelve years. His duties are to superintend the care of the royal wardrobe, to attend on the king in the royal dressing room and to take all instructions concerning the king's clothes which may be given by one of his private secretaries.

His Majesty's clothes are kept in a large room adjoining the dressing room. The walls of the room are lined with wardrobes, which are divided into two sections—one section contains the king's uniform, and the other His Majesty's ordinary morning, walking, and evening suits of clothes.

Overnight, the chief valet is instructed regarding the uniforms, if any, and the suits of clothes which the king will require for wear the following day, and these are placed by the assistant valets in the royal dressing room. Before a suit or uniform is sent into the royal dressing room it is inspected by the chief valet, to see that it is properly brushed, ironed and ready to wear.

Every morning the suits which the king has worn the day previously are brushed and ironed by the assistant valets.

Never Wears Same Suit Two Days

The king, it may be noted, never wears the same suit two days running. As a rule, His Majesty would not wear the same suit oftener than once in the week, and when it had been worn about two dozen times it would be put out of the royal wardrobe.

The present king keeps earlier hours than did his late Majesty, King George. Customarily rises at 7 o'clock, when he takes a cup of light coffee, which the chief valet brings him directly, the king enters his dressing room. His Majesty then has his bath, which is always a cold one, while the king is in the bathroom the chief valet puts the suits into His Majesty's shirt, puts out an assortment of ties on the dressing table and places the boots or shoes the king intends to wear on a mahogany bootstand and then retires.

The king dresses himself without the aid of a valet, except when putting on a uniform, when the chief valet is generally in attendance. When the king is dressed the chief valet superintends the packing of His Majesty's luggage; at the king's destination the list is checked over by the chief valet whilst the portmanteaus are being unpacked.

Chief Valet a Linguist

The king's chief valet is a well educated and very well informed man. He is a first rate linguist, speaking French, German, and Italian, in addition to his native tongue, perfectly. He has travelled all over the world with the king, and is known and held in high esteem by all the great European monarchs, from whom he has received many honors and a number of medals for their services.

King George rarely ever tries on a suit of clothes, and seldom is seen by the tailor who have the honor of His Majesty's custom. When the king desires to order any new clothes he informs the chief valet of the fact, who gets patterns for the king's inspection.

When His Majesty has selected the pattern, the chief valet gives the order to the tailor, and the clothes, when ready for trying on, are fitted on a dummy figure in the king's inspection.

The chief valet inspects the suit when it is fitted on the dummy, and gives the tailor all the alterations necessary to make it fit. A suit is generally fitted on the model three times.

At his services will be a special feature. In the morning the anthems will be Awake Ye Saints (Whitby), and Sing Alleluia (Foster). In the evening, the evening Glory, Blessing and Honor (Whitby), Hear O Lord (Handel's Largo), and Come, let Us Join Our Cherished Songs (Churchill). The organ selections will be at the morning service, Pastorale (Kullah), and at the evening service, "In the Twilight" (Fagel), Recense in A. (Dellmich), March in Bb by Siles; Miss Mabel Sandall, organist. Strangers welcome at both services.

The Selfishness of Celebrities

Considering the progress we are making in good manners and courtesy, it seems singular that the selfishness of celebrities should still continue; although it is but just to state that the influence of our good manners may apply only to new celebrities.

In reading over Mr. Pulitzer's career in a recent magazine issue, one is astonished at the care this great man took to preserve himself from any unnecessary intrusion. His immense talents may have made these precautions a matter of duty; yet it is nevertheless true that in order to accomplish this result he achieved enormous areas of selfishness, and as his biography intimates—he was correspondingly unhappy. This blindness does not necessarily imply unhappiness is a fact very well known. Miss Helen Keller is a remarkable instance.

Tolstoi created many disturbances in his family, and his actions were provocative of much discomfort. He appeared to disregard utterly the feelings of those about him.

Wagner is another instance of intense egotism, in which many people were involved and suffered accordingly. Even our own Mark Twain cannot be exempted from this charge. Mr. Clemens is united with many lovely qualities, an aptness of mind, and a deep understanding of human nature, but his actions might affect other people.

The truth is, that character seems to be undesirable in a genius; or, in fact, in any man who has talent above the common. A man who has inherited talents must be with a little of the egotism of a genius, but in his process of development his character seems gradually to be eliminated. He becomes, as Weininger puts it, unmarred. When a man is unmarred in the highest degree and takes the highest degree of perfection so far as human companionship and citizenship are concerned—Thomas L. Mason in November Lippincott's.
