BLIND SINCE BOYHOOD, NOW HIGH IN BOSTON EDUCATIONAL CIRCLES

Boston, Nov. 1.—Although totally blind since he was seven years old, Eino H. Friberg, son of John Arbig Friberg of Westminster, has become one of the leading students at the College of Liberal Arts of Boston University and has been awarded one of the Augustus Howe Buck scholarships at the college. Friberg was graduated from Waterville High School at the head of his class last summer, after two years there. He has spent two years at the Perkins Institute for the Blind. Through the means of the scholarship, Friberg will be able to study for four years at Boston University, have two years of post graduate study and a possible two years of travel afterward. He is a leader in class activities, and gains his knowledge by having others read to him.

LOAN RUNS IN ADVANCE OF THAT OF LAST YEAR

Close of Fifth Day Sees Subscriptions \$29,000,000, More Than in 1918 Campaign.

The \$20,000,000 mark is rapidly being approached by New Brunswick in the Victory Loan campaign. Aside from St. John, upper Gloucester county is leading the province with \$245,850 for 119 applications. St. John last night had \$70,150 for 775 applications.

A. S. Gardiner, manager here for Armour & Co., received a wire yesterday from the head office instructing him to purchase \$5,000 worth of Victory bonds. St. John's allotment of their purchase.

Toronto, Nov. 1.—The grand total of the Victory Loan at the close of the fifth day of the campaign is \$129,751,600. The total for the same period last year was \$100,602,150. Ontario's total is now \$79,850,950 compared with \$67,571,500 last year. Toronto applications added \$2,544,950 to the loan yesterday. Of this amount \$1,500,000 came from special subscriptions. The total for Toronto is now \$80,500,650 against \$26,738,600 in the same length of time in the last loan.

Quebec has increased its total to \$38,550,250 which includes \$31,248,950 in Montreal. The latest totals available for the other provinces are:

SAYS GOVERNMENT HAS NOT KEPT WORD

Ottawa, Nov. 1.—That the recommendation made by the parliamentary committee on matters pertaining to the re-establishment of soldiers in civil life as well as the question of providing increased gratuities will cost the country fifty million dollars, is the opinion expressed in the full report of the committee tabled in the commons by Hon. J. A. Calder, chairman.

The general findings of the committee, including its decision not to grant further gratuities to returned soldiers under the G. W. V. A. J. Harry Flynn or Margeson plans have already been outlined in Canadian Press dispatches. The committee's estimate of cost of recommendations made is as follows:

1. To provide gratuities to Canadians enlisted in Imperial units—\$20,000,000.
2. To provide refund of transportation expenses to dependents who returned prior to the armistice—\$10,000,000.
3. To provide for carrying out all other recommendations including the handling of the unemployment problem during the coming winter—\$40,000,000.

The report is unanimous, but the Liberal members of the committee, in concurring in its recommendations, moved a qualifying resolution, as follows:

Moved by G. F. Pardee, seconded by A. B. Copp, that:

"Subject to the opinion here-in-after expressed, we reconure in the recommendations of the committee, believing that the evidence submitted by Sir Thomas White, the ex-minister of finance, and Mr. T. C. Boyle, the deputy minister of finance, makes it apparent that the recommendations go as far as the present financial position of Canada will justify."

"We deem it necessary, however, to record our opinion that many of the government's existing commitments are wholly unwarranted and that the financial condition of the country has been brought about by these commitments and the governments past and present extravagance."

The report deals at length with the several suggestions made to the committee as to the different ways in which aid could be granted to returned soldiers. These included suggestions respecting life insurance and provision for financial assistance in the form of loans or grants or pay and allowances to those who desire to take vocational, commercial or industrial training, aid to those whose university, professional or technical education was interrupted by age; to those desirous of establishing themselves in one-man businesses; to those who are in need of assistance to take care of existing liabilities, and generally to those who need assistance for other purposes.

"Regarding these proposals generally, apart from the financial considerations involved the report reads:

"Your committee cannot see its way clear to recommend any form of financial assistance for any particular class or group of ex-members of the forces who were not disabled. Your committee are convinced that the great majority of the men themselves would be the first to resent any such distinction. The one exception made by placing soldiers on the land stands by itself in that the assistance given is regarded as being primarily in the national interest as a settlement scheme."

RECORD NUMBER OF DIVORCE CASES IN DIVORCE COURT

William Edgar Montford vs. Elsie May Montford.—The plaintiff is of Fredericton; defendant at present in Halifax.—The marriage ceremony was performed in July, 1911, by Rev. G. J. Scott, Episcopalian, at St. John. The plaintiff alleges that he enlisted in 1915, went overseas, returning in 1918. Two children were born in wedlock, one in 1913 and the other in 1915. In 1917 the children were taken over and cared for by the Children's Aid Society. The plaintiff accuses his wife of being unfaithful in his absence, names as co-respondents J. J. Thompson, George Best and Fred Ramsey. Absolute divorce is asked. Alleges Another Marriage.

James Hilyard Carson vs. Ernestine M. Carson.—The plaintiff is of Hampton, the defendant at present of Lewiston, Me. She was formerly married to the plaintiff. The marriage was solemnized in St. John by Rev. F. P. Dennison in October, 1917. They lived in Hampton. In February, 1918, the plaintiff enlisted with the 20th Siege Battery at St. John. He alleges that his wife afterwards went to St. John where she was unfaithful to him with a soldier at the Brunswick Hotel, and with others, that in June, 1918, she went through a marriage ceremony performed by Rev. James F. Rowley at Hampton with one Frederick W. Carson, with whom she afterwards lived as man and wife. Divorce is asked on the usual grounds.

Ernest Roland Price vs. Ida May Price.—The parties belong to St. Stephen, the defendant formerly being named Leazer. The marriage ceremony was performed in St. Stephen in November, 1910, by Rev. S. B. Howard, Methodist. A child was born of the union in 1911. In 1914 the plaintiff enlisted with the 20th Battalion and went overseas in June, 1915, returning in May, 1918. The plaintiff alleges that in September, 1916, the defendant left her home in St. Stephen and went to Calais to live with one Frank Hewitt. The husband accuses his wife of being unfaithful to him, also that she is still living with Vickery in Calais. Absolute divorce is asked.

Henry Andrew Hewitt vs. Sarah Hewitt.—The parties are living in St. John. The maiden name of the defendant was McCracken. The marriage took place in St. John in February, 1915, by Rev. David Hutchinson, Baptist, officiating. Two children were the issue of the marriage. The plaintiff states that in August, 1916, he went overseas as a member of the 20th Battalion. He alleges that he returned in July, 1918, that in February, 1919, an illegitimate child was born to his wife and that John Melanson of St. John is the father. Melanson is named as co-respondent.

George Lawrence vs. Annie Lawrence.—The parties belong to Beaufort, Gloucester county, the defendant's name before marriage being Tibbels. The marriage was solemnized by Rev. A. D. McCully in Bathurst in May, 1910. Two children were born in wedlock. In 1915 the plaintiff enlisted with the 20th Battalion and returned in 1918. In July of which year he declares he found his wife with her sister at the home of another man in Moncton. At that time she had in time she arms a child two and a half months old which she acknowledged to be hers and that she also confessed to having borne another child her husband not being the father. Divorce is asked on the ground of infidelity.

George McDonald vs. Mary Louise McDonald.—The parties belong to Kings County. The name of the defendant was formerly Hutchinson. She is living in Marysville where she is a waitress at the Hotel Victoria. The marriage was solemnized in December, 1918, in Moncton by Rev. William J. Lane, Methodist. Two children were born. The plaintiff alleges that his wife, since August, 1917, has been unfaithful to both Upham and St. John, and names Richard W. McDonald as co-respondent.

Warren J. Wilson vs. Irene C. Wilson.—The plaintiff belongs to Hopewell, DeWolfe, Baptist. The plaintiff enlisted in May, 1917, and returned from overseas in April, 1918. He alleges that he charges his wife with having lived on immoral life during his absence and names as co-respondents C. D. Wilson and Herbert Parker.

James William Cook vs. Mamie A. Cook.—The plaintiff belongs to Penobscot Kings county, and the defendant to Sussex. She formerly was named Orr. The marriage was performed in Sussex, April, 1916, by Rev. H. C. Rice, Methodist. The plaintiff alleges that he left with the 104th Battalion in 1916 and returned from overseas in May, 1919, also that his wife was unfaithful. He names Harry Crawford, Leslie Armstrong and Daniel Dunn as co-respondents. Divorce is asked for on usual grounds.

Willie Wallace Branscombe vs. Alice Branscombe.—The parties belong to the Parish of Salisbury, Westmorland county. The name of the defendant was formerly Keith. The marriage took place in Petticoe in December, 1911. Rev. Charles Flemington, Methodist, officiating. The husband accuses the wife of infidelity with M. S. Alward whom he names as co-respondent and states that the wife has given birth to a child of which he is not the father. Divorce is asked for on statutory grounds.
