LLOYD GEORGE MAY ATTEND LEAGUE ON AUSTRIAN SITUATION

Geneva, Aug. 30.—Premier Lloyd-George is expected by some of those closely connected with the League of Nations to come to Geneva during the session of the assembly of the league, which begins Sept. 4.

It is understood Lloyd George desires to join the British delegation when the economic situation of Austria is discussed. There is strong sentiment among league experts that the only economic salvation for Austria is a commercial union with countries detached from her by the treaty of St. Germain, Hungary and Czech-Slovakia, particularly the latter.

Such a union is opposed by Italy. France favors a commercial union between Austria and Czech-Slovakia and possibly other little entente powers, but Italy objects to this.

Alterations—Canadian Pacific Suburban Service, St. John-Welsford, Effective After September 9, 1922.

Daylight saving time will be abolished midnight, September 9th, and after that date Atlantic Time will be restored in the city.

Suburban train schedules will be adjusted accordingly and in addition preliminary cuttings in this service will be made, particulars as given below.

Effective after September 9th, trains leaving the city at 11.20 a.m. and 8.10 p.m. will be cancelled. Trains arriving from Welsford at 2.28 p.m. and 7.00 p.m. cancelled.

Train No. 123 now leaving at 7.15 a.m. and train No. 124 now arriving from Welsford at 9.50 a.m. will continue in service until September 16th, after which date they will be cancelled. Between September 9th and 16th, account of abolition of daylight, train will leave at 5.15 a.m. and arrive at 10.40 a.m.

Train No. 130, now arriving at 5.45 a.m., and train No. 127 now leaving at 8.10 p.m. will be continued in service until September 30th, and then cancelled. After September 9th, train No. 127 will leave at 8.10 p.m. and train No. 130 will arrive at 5.45 a.m.

On Saturdays from September 16th to October 28th, there will be a noon suburban train leaving St. John at 12.20 p.m., and arriving Welsford at 6.55 p.m.

On Saturdays, September 16th, 23rd, and 30th, train No. 127 leaving St. John at 8.10 p.m. will be cancelled, but sent out as train No. 129 at 9.10 p.m., arrive Welsford at 10.10 p.m.

This service being open in month of September on Saturday evenings.

After September 30th, entire suburban train service between St. John and Welsford will be withdrawn with the exception of the 12.20 p.m. and the 8.00 o'clock arrival from Welsford on Saturdays.

After September 16th and until further notice the McAdam express train No. 101 and 102 will be made flag stop at Ketchikan and Ononetta.

After September 9th, train 106 will leave Fredericton at 8.10 a.m., arrive St. John at 7.50 a.m.

Eastern standard time covers all above figures, which is one hour slower than Atlantic.

PREHISTORIC TIGER BONES.

Los Angeles Museum Has Skeleton of Animal 500,000 Years Old.

Los Angeles, Aug. 31.—A complete skeleton of a sabre-tooth tiger, which roamed the southwest in the pleistocene period, some 500,000 years ago, has been assembled at the Los Angeles County Museum of History, Art and Science after long research.

For two years J. W. Lytle, osteological expert at the institution, has worked on the skeleton, searching through a great mass of bones recovered from the famous La Brea pits in Los Angeles City.

Mr. Lytle said he thought the articulated skeleton was the only one of a sabre tooth in which all parts were from one individual animal.

BETRAYING HIS BOOTLEGGING CUTS DEFENDANT'S FINE \$45

Trenton, N. J., Aug. 31.—There's a new way to beat the high cost of illegally possessing liquor. All one has to do is to tell the authorities the name of one's bootlegger.

Howard Saturday of Mount Holly, saved himself \$45 in the United States district court here by this method. Arraigned before Judge Bodine, Saturday pleaded guilty, but declared he could not remember his bootlegger's name.

"In that case the fine will be \$50," said the judge. "But if you could recall the name the fine will be \$25."

Saturday went into executive session with himself and then with Assistant District Attorney Hutchinson. As a result the government got what the court called "information of value," and Saturday paid only \$5.
