Out of this number there have been furnished to the several Auxiliary Societies throughout the Province, 370 Bibles, and 358 New Testaments, and there now remain in the hands of Mr. Black, the Depositary of this Society, chiefly in the French and German Languages, 52 Bibles, and 33 New Testaments.

It is understood, that the Liverpool Branch Society has opened a direct correspondence with the Parent Institution. To this arrangement the Nova-Scotia Bible Society can have no objection. Their desire is for the diffusion of divine truth, be the agents who they may. They would adopt that maxim of a pious and learned writer, the namesake, perhaps the relative, of our Noble President, the present Governor of this Province, the Chevalier RAMSAY, "*N'importe par qui le bien se fasse pourvu que le bien soit fait*, Provided good be done, it matters not by whom."

The best thanks of the Committee are due to many zealous friends throughout the Province; and although they decline, for the reason stated in their last Report, to name them, there are many, whose exertions in favor of the Society from its commencement, have been so eminent and unwearied, as to call for their most sincere and warmest acknowledgments. The Auxiliary Societies of Chester, Annapolis and Hants County, have been particularly active and zealous. Of the prosperity of the Nova-Scotia Bible Society, the Committee are led to entertain good hopes. To the affairs of the Parent Society, no good man can turn his views without a lively exultation.
