TELEPHONE FIGHT WAGED AT PASADENA

Trouble Follows Refusal of the Company to Pay Pole Tax.

Los Angeles, Cal., May 28.-With 893 working lines thrown out of commission by the civil authorities of Pasaena and with Pasadena policemen guarding the severed lines to see that no repairs are made until a pole tax franchise has been obtained by the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph Company, officials of the company met this morning to discuss the rather disastrous outlook. As far as the Sunset Telephone system is concerned no teleones are being operated to-day in Pasadena. Several attempts were male during the night to repair the lines, but the police in all instances in-terfered with the work. Until the matter is adjusted, and that will probably be in the courts, no repairs can be made on the lines without the sanc*

tion of the Pasadena authorities.
