FIND GIRL'S BODY

Frederic Beaumont Will Begin Lived With Another Woman at No Clew to Identity of Young Woman Found by Boys Near New Haven

> Mystery is Increased by Unearthing of Clothing Fifty Feet Away From the Body.

NEW HAVEN, Conn., July 14.—Almost covered by weeds and underbrush, the body of a young woman, about twenty-five years of age, was found late today by two boys who were going to a picnic in West Haven. The body was in a secluded spot of the section known as Allingtown, but whether the woman committed suicide or met with foul play is not deter-

Dr. John F. Barnett, medical exa Dr. John F. Barnett, medical examiner of West Haven, viewed the body as it lay behind the stone wall and said that the woman had been dead for six weeks or two months. Her clothing was of good material and the only lettering on any part was the word "Quigley's," the name of a former dry goods firm in this city.

The features of the girl were unrecognizable. She had a mass of dark brown hair, but there was no jewelry or anything about her person that pecular feature of the case is the fact pecular feature of the case is the fact that a part of the woman's clothing was unearthed fifty feet from the spot where the body was found.

EASTPORT, July 15.—Owing to the scarcity of fish the American sardine canning industry is practically at a standstill. Ordinarily at this season the shoals of fish that furnish a supply of metavial for the fell control. THE DISTRICTS.
