W. S. Tompkins of York Co. Gives the Northumberland Agriculturalists Some Sound Advice.

He compared our markets with other markets in the province, and showed that Northumberland was being made the dumping ground for the farmers of P. E. I. and the other counties of New Brunswick. He told the farmers that this excellent market of the North Shore belonged to them, and to secure it they must increase their product to such an extent as to be able to supply it. He expressed his surprise at the asticultural resources of this county and said the soil must be fertile or it would never stand the continual cropping without rotation. He advised the farmers to pay more attention to dairying, to select their cows, to breed to pure bred males, to increase their

stocks and give them better care, to make a superior quality of butter and to raise cheaper friits.

Taking up the pork question, he gave many valuable hints in prosecuting the industry. There is an unlimited market for pork and beef on this river if the farmers will only give it their attention. He also spoke of the advantages derived from the experimental farms.
