

### SPEAKERS ENDORSE THE EVERY DAY CLUB CHANGE

Ven. W. O. Raymond and Rev. A. B. Coloe Express Opinion That Action to Limit Club Privileges was Wise.

The change of policy adopted by the Every Day Club was very favorably commented on by the speakers at the public meeting in the rooms on Sunday evening.

The president referred to the action of the club in closing the doors to its members, and in making the organization a total abstinence body.

Dr. Raymond, in his address, said that he had every confidence that the members of the club were taking a progressive step and made a strong appeal to men to give the club their earnest support.

Referring to social conditions he said that the amount of street walking by young girls and boys was a disgrace to the city, and that, in respect, St. John did not compare at all favorably with other cities.

Rev. A. B. Coloe, now of Halifax, in whose church the club was organized six years ago, followed.

He spoke of the change in the policy of the club and expressed his confidence that added means his reward the efforts of the gentlemen who had given so much of their time and energies to the work.

He regarded the change as a forward step, a necessary step, and said he was sure that good would come of it.

### THE CHURCH AND THE TEMPERANCE CAUSE

Speaker at Fairville Meeting Says Church Should Take Deeper Interest in the Fight Against Liquor Traffic.

There was a large attendance at the temperance meeting held by No Surrender Lodge in Fairville yesterday afternoon.

E. N. Stockford addressed the meeting and traced the movement of temperance reform from its inception until the present.

The arguments of the opponents were enumerated and the speaker said that history and experience have given the reform had some years ago got beyond the idea of personal total abstinence.

He pointed out that in order to maintain the character of our Christian civilization it was necessary that special efforts should be made to inculcate the hundreds of thousands of immigrants pouring into the country with Christian doctrines and Canadian ideals.

A feature of the musical programme at the service was the rendering of a hymn by a quartette consisting of Messrs. Panham, Holder, Keating and Burke.

There was a large attendance at the meeting in New York, stated that if the church would wake up to the liquor traffic must go, but while the churches are not making any headway in working 365 days in the year.

The speaker closed with a plea for greater effort on the part of temperance workers to arouse the church of God to a deeper interest in this great question.

### JUDGE FORBES IN THE PULPIT

His Honor Spoke In Ludlow Street Church Sunday Evening On The Work Of The Bible Society.

Judge Forbes gave an interesting address in the Ludlow street Baptist church last evening, in the interests of the Bible Society, taking his text from Revelations 2:8. In opening he gave an interesting description of the Book of Revelations, and dealt with the messages it contained for the seven churches of Asia, and went on to speak of St. John, who was exiled from his native city, though he could not be exiled from God.

The great message of Christ's teaching was, he said, the value of sacrifice and service, and in this connection he pointed out that the ministers could not do their work in a satisfactory manner without the assistance and co-operation of their congregations.

Continuing that Judge spoke of the work of the Bible Society, which, during the past year, had distributed 140,000 copies of the Scriptures among 500,000 people, and which in this city alone had raised \$2,000 for its work.

Referring to the fact that the society kept two colporteurs at work in the lumber camps and railway construction camps of the province, he went on to speak of the great opportunities of service which awaited the people of Canada where already the Scriptures were taught in 30 languages, while a total of 110 languages were spoken by the people now living in this country.

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### SOCIALISTS SCORE COMMISSION IDEA

Men Booming Commission Plan Not Likely to Advance Any Beneficial Programme is Speaker's Opinion.

Civic government was the subject of discussion at the Socialist meeting in evening, and the commission movement came in for some criticism.

It was pointed out that the business men of the city, under the pretext of providing a civic park, had changed the system of civic government several times, but that as they had never been inspired by any civic ideals, or put forward any programme of importance, the changes in the system had not proved the cure-alls which they were expected to do.

One speaker said it was a peculiar coincidence that after stating the commission movement the Board of Trade had initiated a movement to have the city sell its lands.

Among other things the Socialists discovered that the paving contractors were making the city out of \$1,500,000 a year, a leakage which they stopped by having the paving work done under the direction of the city engineer by day's labor.

### WHO WOULD BE A KING?

King George the Centre of Brain Racking Discussion Over Coronation Details and Delicate Points.

London, March 12.—King George is now seen daily in Rotten Row, cantering with equestrians. He needs the bracing effect of exercise in the rippling air for he is overwhelmed with the details of various ceremonial of what must be the busiest year of his reign.

The precedents of the last coronation are followed closely, except the minor points, like the substitution of girls for boys, as the Queen's train-bearers, but a series of new questions have been raised for the Delhi coronation and the investiture of the Prince of Wales at Carnarvon, since tradition and recent practice do not cover them.

A thousand novel details connected with regalia and costume and Oriental pageantry need to be determined. The prince's investiture is almost equally as difficult, owing to Welsh sensitiveness.

### RACE RIOTS IN GALVESTON

Serious Disturbances Yesterday As The Result Of The Stabbing Of A White Soldier By An Unidentified Negro.

Galveston, Tex., Mar. 12.—A race riot was precipitated early today by the stabbing of Winfield Joel, a soldier from the camp at Fort Crockett, by an unidentified negro in a resort. One Mexican and four negroes were severely beaten and the house in front of which the stabbing occurred was set on fire and burned to the ground.

Joel who is a member of the 144th company, coast artillery, stationed at Fort Moultrie, Charleston, S. C., was seriously wounded, but probably will recover.

Attacked Every Negro. A remark made by one of Joel's companions about the color of the occupants of the house caused the attack. Joel was about to open the door of the place, it is said, when some one leaned out of an adjoining window and stabbed him. Immediately a crowd of soldiers and civilians attacked every negro in sight and set fire to the place.

Several lines of hose which were being played upon the first fire, were cut by the mob and the fire fighters had to abandon the house to the flames and content themselves with saving the buildings adjoining.

### THE NOVEL IN LITERATURE

Members of Women's Canadian Club Heard Eloquent and Interesting Address from Prof. Day.

For an hour and a half Saturday afternoon, Prof. Day of the chair of English Literature, at the University of New Brunswick, held the rapt attention of the members of the Women's Canadian Club, while he discussed the origin, development, and purpose of the novel, and its place in the general field of literature.

After the meeting was called to order the secretary read the reports of the last executive meeting and 20 new members were elected.

Mrs. E. A. Smith, the president, pointed out that the club had doubled its membership in the past year, referred to the educational work it was trying to do, and then introduced the lecturer, who, she said, had distinguished himself as a Rhodes scholar at Oxford, and was a man of whom the Maritime Provinces should be proud.

In opening his address, Prof. Day spoke of the origin of the novel in Chaucer's time, and traced its development up to the present time. He said the novel, which in its early years dealt with the doings of lords and ladies of high degree, had become imbued with the democratic spirit of the age, and was often used as a vehicle for the promotion of great causes as exemplified by Uncle Tom's Cabin and others.

At the conclusion of the lecture a hearty vote of thanks moved by Mrs. John H. Thomson, and seconded by Mrs. James Humphrey, was tendered the speaker.

The social hour which followed was in charge of Mrs. E. A. Smith, Mrs. Hart, and Mrs. Isaacs. The tea table looked very attractive with its wealth of daffodils and spring flowers.
