New York The World's Greatest Toy Market

Value of Toy Trade is \$75,000,000 per Year, and Much of this Goes to Europe -- Canadian Indian Toys Made in the Heart of Gotham.

New York is by far and away the world's largest toy market, says the left of the Car.

There is in Europe a craze for American toys such as birch bark canoes, bows and arrows, Indian war clubs, bonnets of feathers and red flannel dolls in Indian or cowboy costumes, electrical and mechanical toys which are sold by street hawkers in the American cities.

A factor in making American toys popular in Europe in recent years is the large number of gifts of toys sent from here by fathers, brothers or sisters at the principal stands for the sale of American toys and notions at the great fairs in Europe.

There are 9,583 live patents issued by foreign nations to New York makers of mechanical and other toys. This assures a good market for those toys in countries which possess 250,000,000 children.

Export of toys from this city began to be large in July, and the trade holds out until late in October, when all large consignments of toys for export of Europe must be forwarded to meet requirements for Christmas and New Year trade.

A remarkable development of the toy trade for export has been going on since early summer in the shipment of all kinds of toys to India, and this is mainly because of the Durbar, otherwise the crowning of King George V. as the Emperor of India.

It is 600 years since the coronation of an Emperor of India, and for that reason the 600 native princes of India have arranged to give public entertainments, with special gifts to children throughout India, and the great bazaars of Calcutta, Bombay, Delhi and other large centres of population.

A number of Parsee merchants came here several months ago to buy mechanical, electrical and other kinds of toys for the account of the Durbar festivals in all parts of India. They were in the city for several days, and they are now shipping home in large quantities.

Many Parsee men, Swiss and French made toys on sale in this country are made in this city and its vicinity. The Parsee merchants who are German, Swiss or French who are employed in order to be near the world's greatest market and where the low prices for wood and other materials as compared with costs in Europe give marked advantages to American toy makers and distributors.

One great toy distributor here in this city, with branches in many domestic and foreign cities, catalogues 47,000 kinds of toys of recent domestic design that would sell the world over. Inventors and designers of toys and Yankee notions are liberally paid by the manufacturer, centred in this city.

A local lawyer who invented several toys for the amusement of one of his children confined in a hospital found that the toy surgeon had brought a friend in the toy-making trade to see the toy. The manufacturer offered the lawyer a royalty that last year gave him \$6,000.

The present chief owner of one of the largest metal working factories in this city landed here from Russia a few years ago with just the equivalent of \$5. He bought a few tin toys and peddled them. To attract attention to himself on the street he made a whistle that imitated the bark. A toy maker offered him a royalty and from that time he has made enough money in five years to found a business that now employs 3,500 men and women here in Germany.

A German Jew who landed here a few years ago as a model maker and became a worker with Thomas Alva Edison, and then an electrical toy maker for the amusement of his children. He sold royalty rights to a toy house that in two years paid him \$75,000 and gave him an upward of \$100,000 in royalties. He now enables him to employ 12,000 factory hands in Germany, Russia and Italy.

PALMISTS CONQUER LONDON SOCIETY

Teachers of "Occultism" Even Become Arbiters of Marriage and Finance -- Some Instances Showing their Influence.

London, Oct. 4.—A remarkable re-education of "occultism" has been manifesting itself in London society for some time and has taken the form of a fad. In the entire coronation season perhaps the most popular feature of fashionable gatherings was the palmist or "Egyptian fortune teller" engaged for the evening to entertain the guests.

This feature was found the surest way to draw a crowd and when invitations were sent out the special engagement of some particular "seer" was invariably mentioned as an extra inducement. At these functions it was no uncommon sight to see a long line of distinguished persons waiting their turn to have their fortunes told by one and learn what destiny held in reserve for them.

Lectures on "occultism" and the mystic religions of the east were also popular attractions in many of the best houses in Mayfair and Belgrave. Some previous mystic made a specialty of this branch of occult knowledge, and it is even said that the palmist or "Egyptian fortune teller" engaged for the evening to entertain the guests.

There was one case where an engagement was mysteriously broken off without any apparent cause at the time. It became known later, however, that the young woman had consulted a palmist, only to be informed that the mystic number of her fiance's name did not harmonize with her own, which meant disaster in the event of marriage. Her faith in occultism being stronger than her own, she cancelled the betrothal, she promptly returned to her home.

Throughout the coronation season the palmists and fortune tellers reaped the day and time of the function of all ages who called to consult them about love and marriage. Many, too, journeyed or as to whom they should include among their guests at a particular garden party or reception. Even the day and time of the function were often dictated by the disinterested "seer."

One woman came all the way from Devonshire to consult a crystal gazer regarding the approaching marriage of her daughter. Fortunately the seer pronounced the prospective bridegroom and the wedding was allowed to take place.

Men Take Up Fad.
But women are not alone in their enthusiastic belief in occult powers and divination. Men of prominence in many branches of life have taken up the fad with equal fervor. A certain managing director of a powerful corporation is said to employ a woman palmist at a yearly salary to advise him on all his business transactions and he asserts that he has never made a mistake or lost a cent since he adopted that policy.

OBITUARY
Hugh Tait, formerly a well known engineer on the I. C. R. and a worthy citizen of St. John, died at Providence, R. I., on Wednesday. He had been ill for some time and two daughters who were on a visit here were recently summoned home. Mr. Tait had been a long time in the service of the I. C. R. when he was placed on the pension list, about five years ago. He and his family afterwards removed to Providence. Deceased is survived by one son, Hugh, a machinist and three daughters, Margaret, assistant superintendent of Providence City Hospital; Grace, training in Rhode Island Hospital, and Belle at home here. He lived in St. John, Mr. Tait's home was on Celebration street.
