CHARLES PITCHED GREAT GAME; F.M.A. TEAM BANGOR FALLS TO FREDERICTON WON GAME OF 6 INNINGS

There was a large crowd of fans at the North End grounds Saturday afternoon to witness what proved an excellent game of ball between the Marathons and the St. Croix team, which the Greeks won by a score of 6 to 4.

The second programme of the Driving Club held at Moosepath on Saturday afternoon last was a very creditable one and merited a large attendance which turned out to see them go. Each class was keenly contested and some feature horse racing showed up at times which brought the birds up to the fence and they helped in no small way with encouraging remarks to get their favorites out in front.

The first event announced from the stand was the free-for-all when Starter Thos. Dean made this announcement. The interest was very keen and many anxious moments followed shortly after. Wm. P. McDonald's black mare Pearl Barronmore, with the veteran Thos. Hayes as pilot made her trial here this season and also Frank Mullin's big gelding, Harry Fearless, with his owner as driver, while Bill Brickley came on with the ever popular Jay Wilkes. Past history in the racing game was sufficient to make this card a most interesting event, each horse still retaining his following of admirers.
