Vast Increase in Ordinary Manufactories Aside From Exports for War Puposes Says Mr. Timmerman.

H. F. Timmerman, industrial commissioner of the C. P. R., with head-quarters at Montreal, accompanied Mr.

J. S. Dennis to the city yesterday, and is a guest at the Royal Hotel.

To a reporter Mr. Timmerman said that industrial conditions in Canada were better than ever before. Canadian products exported during 1916 reached the vast amount of \$1,091,706,403, as compared with \$614,129,845 in 1915, and \$370,295,550 in 1914. According to actual returns to the Trade and Commerce Department of the Dominion government only \$130,466,307 of the amount for 1915 represents war products, while Mr. Timmerman voices the opinion that the actual war products for 1916 would not greatly exceed this figure.


