POTATO RUST IN AROOSTOOK CO?

Houston, Aug. 22.—It is reported that potatoes in this section are suffering badly from rust and in some localities the rot has struck quite badly. Rot coming so early in the season is unusual. This will cause much anxiety among the heavy planters. The heavy showers and hot sun have caused the trouble. Farmers as a rule have spent much time and expense in spraying but the frequent showers have tended to wash off the mixture before results were obtained. The first crop of potatoes shipped for the season went out of Houston on Saturday night. These were early table stock. Digging will now be underway in a few weeks time and it is expected that prices will be high. The present price is \$2.75 per barrel. The carload shipped on Saturday was by Albert S. Moore and William Adams.

NO CONTEST IN THE PARISH OF SAINT MARYS

Incorporation of Devon Raised Question of Voting—Soldiers on Casualty List—City Treasurer Happy.

Special to The Standard. Frederickton, Aug. 23.—The difficulty which at one time it was thought might arise in connection with the election to the county council of the St. Mary's representatives in consequence of the creation of the new town of Devon will not materialize, as there will be no contest in that parish. It was thought that inasmuch as under the town's incorporation act, the general act under which the new town comes into being Devon is entitled to a representative in the county council, the rate payers in that town would not be qualified to vote in the parish of St. Mary's. It would seem they would be, as under the act it is expressly provided that the inhabitants of any town shall be entitled to vote in the parish for the municipal council, notwithstanding that another section of the act provides for the selection by the town council of one of the aldermen to attend at the municipal council as a representative of the town. At one of their meetings therefore, prior to the municipal council meeting the Devon council will appoint one of their number to attend on behalf of the town.

Marysville's Position. The town of Marysville is in a somewhat different position. Under the special act of the legislature incorporating that town the ratepayers of it voted with the remainder of the parish of St. Mary's, and the town had no separate representation. By an act passed in 1911, however, Marysville has the right to return two representatives of its own to the municipal council, and it takes no part

whatever in the election of the St. Mary's representatives. Mrs. Kenneth Corbett received official notification this morning that her husband, Pte. Kenneth Corbett, had been admitted to hospital in France, he having been quite seriously wounded on that date. Mr. John Russell, of this city, received official word today that his son, Pte. Roy Russell, was seriously ill and had been admitted to the eighteenth general hospital at Cambray, France. City Treasurer Geo. R. Perkins announced today that the total receipts for the collection of taxes for 1917 up to the close of the discount Tuesday, amounted to \$111,260, the largest amount by far in the history of the city. That such a result could be obtained surprised the officials at city hall.

BLAME BRITISH GOVERNMENT

London Newspapers Urge It to Greater Activity in Aerial Affairs.

London, Aug. 23.—Renewed newspaper attempts to stir the government to greater air activity have followed yesterday's air raid on the southeast coast of England. There also may be more demands for reprisals against the Germans, since the bombing of pleasure resorts like Margate and Southend, which have no military or industrial establishments, arouses indignation even greater than was caused by the attacks on the residential districts of London's poorer classes. The gist of the complaints is that although the fourth year of the war is beginning the British government has not awakened as much as has Germany to the importance of aerial warfare, nor kept abreast of the German designs in improved and powerful types of machines.

Synopsis of Canadian North-

west Land Regulations.

The sole head of a family, or any male over 18

years old, who was at the commencement of the present war, and has since continued to be a British subject or a subject of an allied or neutral country, who has homesteaded a quarter-section of available Dominion Land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan, or Alberta, and who has been domiciled in Canada since the date of his homestead entry, may, upon the expiration of three years from the date of his homestead entry, apply to the Dominion Lands Office for a grant of the land.

When Dominion Lands are advertised or posted

for entry, returned settlers who have served overseas and have been honorably discharged, receive one day priority in applying for entry at local Agent's Office, and no notice in each of these cases must be presented to Agent.
