**Quarterdeck Brutality.**

The latest story of barbarity at sea is told of the clipper ship Sunnie, which recently arrived in San Francisco from New York by way of Cape Horn. In brief, the crew state that two men committed suicide to escape cruel treatment, and a third fell from the yard-arm through exhaustion. The ship's log contains the triple record of deaths. The captain and mate found continual amusement in beating and kicking the men, making them stand motionless on deck, without food or water, for twenty-four hours, and compelling them to scrape and scrub the deck for thirty-six hours without intermission. They succeeded in making the ship a floating instrument of torture, from which the men were glad to escape by seeking rest under the waves. Madden-

ed by the tortures heaped upon them, two of the seamen jumped overboard, and a third fell from the yard-arm, having been sent aloft after standing an entire day on deck without food or drink. The captain often told the sailors that they would never reach San Francisco, and that he would compel them to jump overboard. When the men were weak and fatigued from the continual use of punishment, want of rest and labor, he would order them aloft, and then try to throw them from their places by letting the hallelujah, and other devices. In reply to these grave charges, however, the Captain states that whatever harsh punishment was practiced on his vessel, was merely disciplinary, and that in no instance were the sailors unjustly treated. The affair is to undergo judicial investigation, and it remains to be seen whether the charges which are brought by the sailors will be sustained.
