He received a present of twigs from Turkey, and observing a twig in the basket ready to bud, he planted it in his garden, and it soon became a fine tree. From this stock, all the weeping willows in England and America originated.

(The Willow was introduced in Nova-Scotia, by a gentleman's breaking up a Dutch basket, and planting the parts in his ground.)
