HIV PREVENTION FOR RCMP MEMBERS — NEW "KIT" OF ANTI-VIRUS DRUGS A

recent CBC television show spotlighted a "kit" of three anti-viral drugs to be taken within hours of a high risk needlestick or other high risk exposure to HIV, the virus which causes AIDS. This kit comes from a series of recommendations, known as the "post exposure prophylaxis" (PEP) protocol, made this year by the Centre for Disease Control Atlanta. This protocol should now be in place in most Canadian hospital emergency rooms. If you suffer a needlestick injury, or other biohazard exposure, go to the nearest emergency room and ask about the PEP protocol. These medications are expensive; if an ER doctor prescribes them for you they will be paid for by the RCMP.
