

We regret to learn that Mr. Peter Buchanan brother of Mr. Isaac Buchanan, M. P. P. recently met with an accident, which resulted in his death. He was accidentally shot in the leg by his companion; and died of the injury at Adamton, Ayrshire. The death of this gentleman it is understood, will make no difference in the business of the firm, in which both brothers were partners. Mr. Isaac Buchanan, we hear leaves for Scotland immediately, in consequence of the melancholy death of his brother.

Quite recently two Russian travellers, named Melkoff and Ivanoff, found a percussion shell on a ruined bastion. One of them having taken it up, in throwing it down again, caused it to explode. Ivanoff was killed on the spot, and Melkoff so seriously injured that his life is despaired of.
