**WITHDRAWAL OF ARGENTINE DELEGATES FROM LEAGUE WAS EXPRESSLY ORDERED**

President of South American Republic Insisted That Delegates Should Carry Out Instructions Demanding That All Sovereign States Should Have Right of Membership in League.

BUENOS AIRES, Feb. 3.—(Associated Press).—The withdrawal of the Argentine delegates from the League of Nations Assembly at Geneva was expressly ordered by President Irigoyen, after the chief of the Argentine delegation inquired whether Argentina would be satisfied with a partial compliance with its demand that all sovereign states should have the right of membership in the league. This has been disclosed by official documents now made public here confirming previous unofficial declarations that President Irigoyen had personally directed the action of the Argentine delegation at Geneva.

Pueyrredon, head of the Argentine delegation, had been instructed before the meeting of the league assembly that the Argentine delegation must not compromise itself in any way or take any part in the work of the assembly before a decision had been reached on the fundamental proposition that all sovereign states are entitled to admission.

After opposition developed in the assembly to the Argentine proposal, Dr. Pueyrredon sent a message to President Irigoyen requesting that while the assembly might not definitely decide on the proposition, he should inform the Argentine states that all the sovereign states that had requested admission, including two former enemies of the Allies, Austria and Bulgaria, would be admitted. The chief delegate said that this would leave out of the league only Germany, the United States and Japan, and that these had not asked admission.

Dr. Pueyrredon inquired whether, in view of that situation, Argentina would still demand a definite declaration from the league that it would not accept a partial adoption of his idea. He called that if Argentina was to take the proper step to be taken in connection with a retirement from the league, he would be glad to be taken into consideration from Buenos Aires itself, as a retirement from the league would be considered outside the usual procedure in a deliberative assembly.

**MODEST AUTHOR LEADS CURIOUS A LONG SEARCH**

"William Denham, Knight," On Prime Minister's List, Proves a Mystery.

EXPERTS ARE PUZZLED

Coalition Whip Ultimately Re-members and Identifies Unionist Supporter.

LONDON, Feb. 3.—There is such a thing as overdoing modesty for the opinion of persons in London literary circles who for some days worried themselves considerably with efforts to find out who the newly-made knight by the name of William Denham could be. The name in the list issued by the prime minister, he was described merely as "author and writer."

Next he made inquiries of the secretary of Premier Lloyd George, the Authors Club, Max Pemberton of the London School of Journalism, Sir Harry Brittain, the Pilgrims' Guild, the headquarters of the Unionist Party, the Board of Trade, the coalition whip's office and a dozen Government offices and other likely places, at the end of which search his name still was zero. Finally the indefatigable reporter began calling up all the Denhams in the telephone book. One of these afforded a slight hope. Yes he had a book in his library by a Denham. He would look it up. But he returned to the telephone presently to announce that the Denham he had written that book had not used his initials and that besides it was printed in 1812, so that the author probably was no longer among the living.

**NEWSPRINT PRODUCTION ON INCREASE IN U. S.**

New York, Feb. 4.—(By Canadian Press).—Figures compiled by the federal trade commission show that the production of newsprint in the United States is on the increase. The output of the United States mills for the twelve months ending December 31, 1920, amounted to 1,511,888 tons, against 1,374,517 tons in 1919, and 1,260,235 tons in 1918. While many United States publishers are still largely dependent upon Canada for their supplies, there are indications that the recent increase in price effected by some of the Canadian mills has turned United States consumers to other mills. That if the prices of the Canadian product are maintained at their present high level, Canada's export newsprint business may be seriously affected.

The trade commission's statistics show that the Dominion manufacturers' petition from Europe. In November, 1919, Canada had a monopoly of the newsprint being received in this country from Europe, while Canadian mills sent 59,226 tons of non-dutiable printing paper (which includes practically all newsprint) to this country. In November, 1920, however, Canada's share of the trade was cut down to 53,837 tons, while imports from Europe were 4,389 tons; from Sweden, 2,280 tons; from Norway, 1,472 tons.

"It has found itself alone in the hour of deliberation on the final destiny of human peace, not seeking followers and even courteously declining those that offered because it felt desirous to do for humanity it could not refrain from making an effort. It is not contented that in the end supreme justice will impose itself on the world."

It is shown by the documents also that as early as March 13, 1919, the Argentine Government had taken its position on the eligibility of sovereign states to membership in the league by informing its minister in Paris that "for the purpose of negotiating to form a league this Government does not accept any 'treaties'." Under these instructions the Argentine ministers attended a private meeting presided over by Lord Robert Cecil in Paris in March, 1919, in which a declaration of Argentina's "adhesion in general" to the society of nations with reservations concerning the form and the opportunity of discussion.

The Argentine Government officials have stated that Argentina will not formally announce its withdrawal from the league because it takes the ground that it has given only its "adhesion in general" to the league, and that this did not constitute actual membership.

**POPE'S CONVENT BAN LAID TO PRO-GERMANS**

Sisters Expelled in Alsace Made Trouble, It Is Said.

LONDON, Feb. 3.—That perennial of the Carmelite convent in the village of Marienthal, in Alsace, is beginning to have results which may reveal whether the convent, as some assert, was the scene of wild orgies or whether the whole furor was aroused by German nuns who were expelled from Alsace because they refused to adopt French nationality.

The father of a nun known as Sister Marguerite, who apparently has lent too willing an ear to the tales of wild life, has demanded that the legal authorities force his daughter, who is under 21, to return home. This she refused to do, insisting that she will never leave the convent unless compelled by force.

Friends of the convent are petitioning the pope to direct an impartial investigation of all charges, but since the bull was issued the Vatican persists in ignoring everything relating to the excommunicated group. The public of Marienthal is vigorously condemning the methods used by the pope's envoy, who prohibited the continuance of the convent. It now seems that this emissary not only forced his way into the convent, but that the aid of a stock-monger succeeded in removing sacred relics, despite cries of protest from the occupants.

The sisters insist that during the war they were not engaged in anti-German propaganda, although they admit that a superior now dead left a written prophecy that once the French troops entered Alsace the war would end abruptly. It is suggested that it was this prophecy that aroused the ire of the German nuns, who in turn succeeded in obtaining the papal injunction.
