### M. O. Situation in Michigan Cities

Sam Howard, in The Daily Flint Journal says: "The Flint baseball club, of the Michigan-Ontario League, has already signed several soliders, including Benny Allen, Beck and Frank Fisher, but the latest one of the bunch so far is Arthur Treffy, who enlisted three days after the close of the Michigan League season of 1917 after playing throughout that season with the Flint club."

Treffy returned from France last week and is now at Camp Zachary Taylor, Louisville, Ky. He is an Indianapolis boy and has a mother there who is lending ready assistance to Manager Jas. "Hump" Pierce's plans to get Arthur out of khaki. This will be an easy matter now that he has a job.

Treffy was dear to the hearts of the fans in 1917, both because of his speed and because of the rate at which he was increasing it. He is an outfielder, heavy on the stick, fast on the paths and very daring at fading into a base.

Owner Halligan, of the Flint club, came back from Sunday's schedule meeting at Bay City with an avaricious glint in his eye. He heard that Kitchener had already collected \$3,000 by the sale of \$10 tickets; Battle Creek the same amount, and Bay City \$4,000, also by the \$10 ticket.

The local campaign will be started again on Wednesday with the intention of finishing it up at once. There is no doubt but that it will be easily accomplished, now that the Board of Commerce teams are through with their election campaigns.

Flint has it on both Saginaw and Bay City in the matter of the condition of its park. The city does the fixing here, but the up-state clubs will have to dig for \$2,000 and \$800, respectively.

"Hump" Finds Comedy.

"Hump" Pierce discovered the comedy at the Bay City meeting. It was "Sandy" Ballentine, the 13-year-old delegate from the Hamilton club, who confesses that he has sold lots of whisky in his time, but looks like a Sunday school superintendent. "Sandy" kept insisting that he absolutely could not get back to Hamilton unless he got one more Saturday on the schedule. Over in Ontario, they fight for Saturday dates. Sunday ball being illegal. "Sandy" got eight, faring better than any of his compatriots. Coming down in the car, he confessed that nothing ever was secured without a fight.

Flint is the star of all the clubs in the matter of week-end engagements, having 12 games at home on Sundays.

J.M. Kerr in the Bay City Times Tribune, says: "Stockholders in the Bay City club of the Michigan-Ontario League are not going to let any grass grow under their feet in an effort to put the local playing field in tip-top condition for the start of the prepping season the last of this month, and plans are already under way for the renovation of Clarkson Park so that by May 15, when the league will get under way, the local diamond will be one of the best on the circuit, and the same statement will hold good regarding accommodations for the fans who turn out to witness the games."

A contract was... yesterday to Henry Weber. Construction Company for the rebuilding of the bleachers, which will be strengthened and made perfectly safe in all respects. A ground keeper will be hired to start going over the infield and putting the entire field in shape as fast as weather permits, and the grand stand is to be fixed up so that local fans will not recognize it, the repairs and changes will be so complete. Manager Cristall is spending his time these days in going over samples in an effort to select uniforms for the team. The color combination has not yet been decided upon, but Spaulding suits will be purchased, it is understood, and the management has already made arrangements for 16 dozen balls, so the first players to report will have an opportunity of throwing all they want to.

Opening Day Plans.

According to the plan in mind, Mayor Mundy will be asked to declare a half holiday on Thursday, May 15, when the opening game of the season will be played. A parade through the downtown district and out to the park is included in the arrangements and in order to make an auspicious start Mayor Mundy will pitch the first ball. Circuit Judge S.G. Houghton will be on the receiving end, and President Thomas H. Burton, of the local club, will attempt to prove his prowess as a slugger.

In connection with the first ball arrangements, the fans are assured of a lot of sport. Someone has uncovered the fact that President Burton and Mayor Mundy, while closely associated in business have been lifelong enemies (?) over political questions and the feeling between them is sure to crop out when Tom steps to the plate to hammer Hob's offerings. Although the mayor has not been asked to throw as yet, the plans not having advanced that far, it is understood that if he isn't asked, it is going to offer to do it, and neighbors state that he can be seen in his back yard every morning throwing at a knot-hole in the fence to get control, his main ambition being to strike out Mr. Burton, who on the other hand is planning on nothing less than a home run when he steps to the plate.

Shares in the club have been going fast, to date 44 of the 50 shares offered for sale, being sold and it is expected that these will be grabbed up in short order. Some of the men who have already signed up are willing to take as many as fifteen shares, but the officers will try to stick to the plan of one share to a man.
