SHEEP RAISING

All farmers who are interested in
sheep raising will be glad to know
that an opportunity is offered to
learn more about that industry. On
Monday, June 16th, the sheep ex-
tension car sent out by the Do-
minion Government will be at Kent-
ville, all day, and Mr. James A.
Telfer, an expert in sheep husband-
ry, will deliver addresses on the
subject during the day. Any in-
formation which farmers may want
can be obtained and we feel sure
there are many who will be present
at Kentville that day to examine the
car and receive the information
which will be given.

Sheep raising is getting to be a
most important industry. We have
many sections of our valley just
suited for such a purpose. Farmers
complain that the dog nuisance is
the reason why more in the line of
sheep raising is not taken up by our
people. Where we have land pecu-
liarly adapted for sheep raising and
as the industry when conducted in
an intelligent manner, is very pro-
fitable, owners of such land should
seek to increase their income by
this means.

Let all who desire to obtain in-
formation from an expert on sheep
raising come to Kentville on Mon-
day and visit the car, see the exhibit,
and hear Mr. Telfer.
