Both legs were broken and the American physician pronounced him as good as dead, but his father took him to Liverpool, where he placed him under the care of a celebrated bone-setter of that city, Evan Thorn. After three months under Thorn's care he was pronounced recovered. He then went to his family in Scotland. He was educated at Porto Bello and then at the Edinburgh Collegiate school from which he entered the University of that city. He took an arts course and graduated as M. A. in April, 1878, and subsequently as L. L. B. in August, 1881. He then entered Middle Temple, London, England, as a student at law and passed his examination in Hilary term, 1883. He then went to Denmark for a trip and returned to Victoria, British Columbia in October, 1883, where he has since practiced his profession. He is a bencher of the Law Society, a member of the Board of Trade and secretary of the Royal Hospital.
