

into competition with Canadian or Australian goods, then they put up a protective duty for the protection of their goods. The Leader of the Opposition said that his objection to the policy which we had adopted at this Conference was that we were destroying Imperial economic unity, and now hon. Members opposite are approving Dominion policy which frankly, honestly and deliberately says that the purpose is to keep out British manufactures."

"That is the purpose of Canada, too." (Referring to statement that Australia's purpose was 'to bring your factories to Australia) Therefore, they put up these tariffs to try to compel us to dismantle our mills here."

"It means that they will keep on their prohibitive tariffs against the goods of this country, and they will put a slight increase upon the rates supplied to foreign imports."

(Snowden) Mr. Joseph Chamberlain said: "The very valuable experience which we have derived from the history of the Canadian tariff shows that while we may most readily and gratefully accept from you any preference which you may be willing voluntarily to accord us we cannot bargain with you for it, we cannot pay for it, unless you go much further and enable us to enter your home market on terms of greater equality.
