A. Defence obligations

Present military and financial commitments of United Kingdom Government

(discussed by Commonwealth Ministers at meeting on May 22, 1946).

1. Armed forces. Strength during 1947 beginning 1,194,000 end 1,077,000

2. Announcement shortly to be made continuing compulsory military service for two years (probably required for five years and for first time in Britain's history in peace-time).

3. Total military expenditure current year £1,200,000,000 plus additional charges, end of war (largely non-recurring) £ 576,000,000

Of the overall figure (£1,200,000,000) expected expenditures overseas

£ 250,000,000

Other compulsory expenditures overseas (developmental and continuation of pre-1939 projects)

£ 195,000,000

B. Comments on this situation by U.K. Ministers

## Mr. Bevin:

Ting!

- 1) Cost of overseas commitments by U.K. had formerly been met by income from foreign investments.
- 2) In changed circumstances, only by increased exports of manufactured goods could overseas expenditures be met.
- 3) This in turn implied serious strain on <u>man-power</u> (500,000 a year additional for export industries alone).
- 4) Also involved would be repayments under U.S. Loan.
