REVOLUTION'S RED FLAG

Floats From Masthead of Black
Sea Battleship.

Russian Sailors Mutiny, Kill Officers of
the Kniaz Potemkin, and Seize
Most Powerful Battleship of Rus-
sia's Black Sea Fleet—Main Squa-
dron Expected at Once and a Naval
Battle in Russia's Civil War is in
Prospect.

Odesa, June 23.—The red flag of re-
volution is hoisted on the masthead
of the Kniaz Potemkin, Russia's most
powerful battleship in the Black Sea,
which now lies in the hands of mu-
tineers. The captain and most of the
officers were murdered and thrown
overboard in the open sea and the ship
is completely in the possession of the
crew, and a few officers who have
thrown in their lot with the mutineers.
The guns of the Kniaz Potemkin com-
mand the city and in the streets men
of striking workmen who Tuesday
fled before the volleys of the troops
are now inflamed by the spectacle of
open revolt on board an Imperial war-
ship and are making a bold front
against the military. All day long a
fight has been heard in many quarters
of the city. A number of barricades
have been erected and tumult and dis-
order reign.

The main squadron of the Black
Sea fleet, consisting of the battleships,
Georgii Pobedonosets, Trisviatitsa,
Rostislav and Ekaterina II, with two
cruisers were expected to arrive here
last night and a naval battle is in pros-
pect.

Sailor Was Shot.
The mutiny arose from the shooting
of a sailor who was presenting, on be-
half of the crew, a complaint against
the captain. According to one version,
this sailor objected to the quality of
the soup, and was immediately shot
by a mess officer. The crew then re-
sisted and seized the ship and the
eight of whom were spared on condi-
tion that they would join the mu-
tineers. The others were killed and their
bodies thrown overboard.

The Kniaz Potemkin arrived here
Tuesday night, accompanied by two
torpedo boats. Early the body of the
sailor was brought ashore and landed
on the new mole, where it has been
exposed in a casket all day. It was
visited by thousands of people, many
of whom placed coins in a casket at
the head of the body towards a fund
to defray the cost of the funeral,
which the sailors propose to hold to-
day, and which the strikers will make
the occasion of a great demonstration.

Under the Ships Guns.
The authorities have made no at-
tempt to remove the body, the sailors
having served notice that the ship
would open fire on anyone seeking to
interfere with it. A police agent visit-
ing the spot was killed by strikers.

During the day a red flag was hoisted
on the Kniaz Potemkin and mem-
bers of the crew rode from ship to ship
in the harbor, stopping all work there-
on. The strike is now general here and
the rioters are growing in numbers and
boldness. There were shots all day.
Last night a bomb was thrown in
the harbor, killing its thrower and a
police man.

During the day one of the torpedo
boats which accompanied the Kniaz
Potemkin seized the Russian steamer
Esperanza, laden with two thousand
tons of coal, which the battleship has
taken on.

The Harbor in Flare.
London, June 23.—A despatch from
Odesa says:

The whole of the quays and the
buildings around the harbor, as well
as much shipping, are in flames. Mobs
of incendiaries armed with dynamite
and the fire brigade from workmen. The
troops are completely terror-stricken
and are afraid to approach within range
of the Kniaz Potemkin's guns.

"It is impossible," says the Standard's
correspondent, "that the men of four
other battleships multiplied at Sebasto-
pol and that two of the ships are on
the way to join the Potemkin."

Two hours ago a huge mob broke
through the military cordon round the
town and looted two large customs
warehouses.

Last night the Potemkin moved
closer to the breakwater with her guns
still trained on the city."

May Precipitate Crisis.
St. Petersburg, June 23.—The news
of the mutiny coming when Poland is
in a state of ferment, when agrarian
disorders are coming to a head and
when the Government is attempting a
coup, may easily precipitate a crisis,
and the authorities are endeavoring to
keep it from the public.

Nevertheless the Liberals and agi-
tators have ways of spreading the tid-
ing and the news was known here in
all the cafes at midnight.

The Radicals hail the event as the
dawn of an actual armed revolution
and say Smiltchuk's (the sailor who
was shot) name will go down in history
as that of a martyr who precipitated
a Russian revolution.

MURDER IS CHARGED.

Hamilton Jury Says Fieldhouse Was
Killed By a Blow.

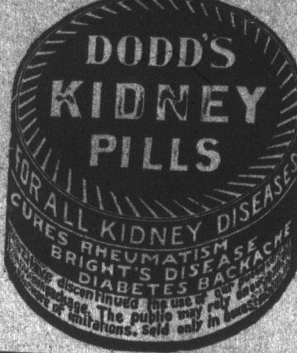
Hamilton, June 23.—This was the
verdict of the jury in the Charles
King murder case yesterday afternoon.
The judge summed up strongly ap-
parently little concern at the an-
nouncement of the verdict.

His Lordship asked the prisoner if
he had anything to say why the sen-
tence of death should not be passed.
King said:

"I am not guilty. Last time I saw
Hayward he was alive. I hope, if he
is dead, and has been murdered, that
the murderer will soon be found."

The judge sentenced the prisoner to
be hanged Aug. 31, next, and said he
could hold out no hope of executive
clemency.

SEIZED DURING NIGHT

Unwilling Russian Reservists
Marched to Barracks.

Authorities Not Mobilizing in Poland
Where Troops Are Needed—Warsaw
and Lodz Exempt—Conditions at
Lodz Unchanged—Strike Situation
Worse at Odesa—Collisions With
the Cossacks and Police Continue.

St. Petersburg, June 23.—The mobi-
lization in St. Petersburg and Moscow
began at midnight yesterday. Many
of the reserve men who did not re-
spond were seized during the night at
their homes. All day long men have
been marched to barracks under escort.
The mobilization includes Tsarke-
vitsa, Pskov, and other towns in St.
Petersburg Province. The workmen
are grumbling and trouble is expected,
but nothing thus far has occurred.
Sixty thousand men have been called
to the colors.

The proposed mobilization in Russian
Poland will be confined to certain coun-
try districts of the Southern Provinces
of Poland, exempting Warsaw and
Lodz, where orders have been given
to take in from the reserves the suf-
ficient number of men to make up the
regular complement of regiments which
have been reduced in strength by send-
ing men to the Far East, thus keeping
up the full strength of the regiments
in Russian Poland.

The efforts of the Socialists since
Friday to bring about a general strike
here have failed completely. The strike,
however, among the coal workers in
Southern Poland near the German and
Austrian frontiers has again broken
out and it is reported here to be se-
rious.

Vice-Admiral Choukine, commander
of the Black Sea fleet, has declined to
accept the post of Minister of Marine
in succession to Admiral Avellan, who
recently resigned.

News comes from Tambov Province
that M. Bekobratov, president of the
Yalu Timber Co., who has been living
on his magnificent estate in that Pro-
vince, has been obliged to invoke the
aid of the military not only to protect
his property but to save his life.

Go Back to Work.
Warsaw, June 23.—The conditions of
Lodz are unchanged excepting that
most of the workmen have returned
to work. Out of 60,000 strikers about
7,000 from 25 factories, remain out.
Martial law still prevails. The streets
are constantly patrolled and the shop-
keepers are all closed. The universal
condemnation of the strike movement
at Lodz has had the effect of quieting
the situation and it is expected that
the remaining strikers will soon resume
work.

A strike was declared yesterday at
the coal and iron mines, foundries and
factories in the districts of Dombrowa,
Silesia, and Sosnowice.

The excitement arising from the
events at Lodz and Warsaw has spread
to the cities in all the old Polish Pro-
vinces along the western border of
Russia. Poland proper. At Minsk and
Kovno policemen have been attacked
in the streets and at the latter place
a jail delivery occurred. At Klon
about two hundred Jews making a
demonstration and carrying a red
flag were ridden down by gendarmes
and Cossacks. Many arrests were made
but no loss of life has been reported.

Warsaw at Odesa.
The strike situation at Odesa is
growing worse. Some collisions be-
tween strikers and Cossacks have oc-
curred, but the details received are
meagre. The population is in a state
of panic.

Elisabethgrad, Government of Kherson,
Russia, June 23.—On account of the
threatening nature of the agrarian
movement in the adjoining districts the
Governor of Kherson, M. Lewaschew,
has arrived here, and Cossacks have
been summoned. Many landlids are
fleeing from their estates into the
city.

Sebastopol, Russia, June 23.—Eight
sailors found guilty of mutiny were
sentenced here yesterday to three
years' imprisonment.

Ekaterinow, Russia, June 23.—The
peasants have set fire to the buildings
of several land owners.

Yuzovka, Russia, June 23.—The
workmen in the Karpoff mine have
gone out on strike.
