Vienna, Nov. 28.—The Wiener Allgemeine Zeitung has a telegram from Berlin which attracts general attention, and arouses anxiety regarding Emperor William. The journal in question is often in receipt of semi-official information. The telegram mentioned says: "Though there can be no doubt that the recent operation on Emperor William concerned a benignant formation, the process of healing has not taken the favorable course hoped for.
