GROWTH OF OUR FISHERIES GROWTH OF OUR FISHERIES.

When the Dominion's Department of Marine and Fisheries was first organized in 1868 the number of lighthouses, lightships, etc., was less than 200; today there are 1,291, and the Marconi installation is more extensive than anywhere else in the world. Then the vessels on the Canadian registry had a trifling tonnage; to-day there are over 8,400, with a net tonnage of more than 840,000, giving Canada ninth position among the shipping countries of the world. As to fisheries, when the Department was created the yield was less than \$10,000,000; now it has gone up to nearly \$33,000,000.
