Livestock News

GREATEST HEREFORD SALE

On March 17, Warren T. McCay of Kentland, Indiana, sold 75 head of Herefords, composed of 25 bulls and 50 females, for a grand average of \$1.287. This is not only a record for Herefords, but also a record for any beef breed. The nearest approach to it was the Hereford sale of Overton Harris in March, this year, when an average of \$1.246 was secured. The 25 bulls averaged \$1.911.60. "Superior Fairfax," a son of the great "Perfection Fairfax," was knocked down at \$10,000. "Letham Fairfax," an other son, brought \$4,100. The females averaged by and in calf to "Perfection Fairfax" were in great demand. "Winifred Fairfax" sold for \$4,000, the highest priced female of the sale, and went to Eastern Canada. Two cows, "Hila Seaside" and "Miss Armour Fairfax," sold last winter by J. A. Chapman, Hayfield, Man., to Mr. McCay, brought \$1,525 and \$1,625 respectively. The fifty females averaged \$868. Fourteen sons of "Perfection Fairfax" averaged \$2,485, and eighteen daughters \$1,255, a total of \$557,400 for his get, a sum greater than that ever paid for the progeny of any size of any beef breed. The attendance at the sale was large, and it was another distinct tribute not only to the remarkable popularity of Hereford cattle but also to the careful systematic progress in breeding policy followed out on Orchard Lake Farm.

GOOD CLYDESDALE SALES

Messrs. P. M. Brodt, of Calgary, have reported some good sales of Clydesdale stallions this spring, having just delivered to Mr. Wright of Drinkwater, Sask. the good draft stallion "Royal Trustee" to Mr. Brown, of Medicine Hat Alta., the three-year-old stallion "Grand View Dundee" to Mr. Armstrong, of Botha, Alta., the draft three-year-old "Western Hero" to Mr. Allen, of Crossfield, Alta., the good breeding horse "Monogram," and to Mr. Nash of Gladys, Alta., the big horse, "Arnone," all horses of great scale and quality. They also sold to Mr. Small, of Maple Creek, two Welsh ponies.

INTERNATIONAL PLANS FOR 1916

Preliminary plans for the International Livestock Exposition at Chicago have been arranged. This will be the first International since 1913, the 1914 and 1915 shows having been abandoned owing to the foot and mouth disease invasion. It is anticipated that the 1916 show will be the greatest livestock show ever yet held in America or in the world. Two years without a show plus the tremendous impetus given livestock interests by present prices both for commercial and breeding stock will make this the greatest looked for event in the year amongst stock men. R. H. Heide, Union Stockyards, Chicago, is the general superintendent.

EDMONTON EXHIBITION FOR 1916

The price list for the summer exhibition is now out. Among the features noted are additions of \$1.00 to the prices for cattle, and \$1.25 in prices for sheep. The system of varying the prices according to the number of entries in the ring has been adopted to some considerable extent for the Edmonton Exhibition Association this year. For instance, in the breeding classes for light horses, where six entries appear in the ring, an additional price of \$1 will be added, and \$2 will be added to each price in the class for 3 year olds and over, and for horses under that age an additional price of \$1, with \$2 added to each price. For heavy horses, where the prices have been more generous, in the event of 8 entries appearing in the ring, for 3 year olds and over an extra price of \$5 will be added, with \$5 added to each price in the class for horses under that age. The same principle is being carried out with \$1 as the added price. In addition to the \$1.00 added for cattle, the same principle is again applied for eight entries in the ring. In sheep and swine the system is also being worked out, while for poultry it has been gone into on a more elaborate scale, with the idea of encouraging the utility breeds. The total amount offered in cash prizes is \$27,180.

CALGARY SUMMER FAIR

Calgary is offering its regular list of prizes at the summer exhibition, but on the same basis as those awarded at the spring show.
