A GROSS MISREPRESENTATION.

Our esteemed local contemporary which is "First in Everything," while The Courier is "Supreme in Everything," should try and get rid of the habit of misrepresenting political opponents. In its edition of last evening it features a despatch from Toronto under the heading: "River Improvements under discussion." "Ontario Government Has not made any appropriation." "No further ahead than five years ago," says Mr. Brewster.
