DETAINED AT DEAL. New York, June 23.—The steamer Nordham reached here to-day from Rotterdam with 234 passengers being detained three days at Deal by British warships. Passengers said that no one was removed from the vessel and that the mails and cargo were not disturbed. No explanation they said was given for the detention.

IN NEW YORK. New York, June 23.—Baron Vladimir de Stackelberg, a lieutenant-general of the Russian Field Artillery, who recently was wounded in battle, arrived here last night on the French line steamer Niagara from Bordeaux. He left for Washington to join members of his family and later expects to return to France.

PLACED ON TRIAL. Columbus, O., June 23.—Charged with having defrauded the government out of oleomargarine taxes amounting to more than \$2,000,000, four officials of the old Capital City Dairy Company of Columbus, were placed on trial in federal court here to-day.

## ACTING PREMIER OFF TO ENGLAND

Hon. Dr. Pyne Will Consult Imperial Authorities About Hospital.

Toronto, June 23.—Hon. Dr. Pyne, Minister of Education, leaves to-day en route to England, where he will consult with the Imperial authorities in connection with the proposal of the Ontario Government to establish a war hospital in England. He goes in pursuance of the decision of the Cabinet in order to give effect most expeditiously to the wishes of the people of Ontario, a responsible representative of the Government should consult with the Army Council and be on the spot to determine exactly what action should be taken to obtain the best result.

The Minister's stay will be an indefinite one. Upon his conference with the Imperial authorities will depend largely whether he will return after discussing the matter thoroughly and passing up plans for construction and equipment or will remain a longer period to take part in the initial organization work. The fact that the Ontario Government's offer was broadly made left, of course, a large number of matters within its bounds that had to be thrashed out. As the only medical man in the Cabinet, Hon. 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## BRITISH "RECRUITS" HELD AT NEW YORK

Eleven Reservists Were on Way From San Francisco to England.

New York, June 22.—Acting upon instructions from Washington, Assistant United States District Attorney Roger B. Wood to-day obtained an order for the detention of eleven men alleged to have enlisted at San Francisco for the British army, by Ralph K. Blair. The eleven, it was claimed, were on their way to England.

The order of detention was made in accordance with the Federal Criminal Code, which declares it to be unlawful for anyone in the United States to enlist or induce another to go beyond the jurisdiction of this country for service as a soldier, sailor, marine, or aviator.

The men were said to have arrived here from the Pacific coast yesterday, and they expected, Government officials say, to sail on the S.S. Arabic tomorrow. They were held at the corner of the continent at the expense of the Government.

AS A PATRIOTIC ACT. San Francisco, June 22.—Ralph K. Blair, at whose office the alleged recruiting for the British army was done, is said to have been carried on, told the United States District Attorney, it was learned to-day, that he aided a number of British veterans to return "as a patriotic act."

He said that the men who had served in the British army were "enlisted." He said he examined them for fitness, but received no pay for his work. He said he sent 75 men, all veterans, on their way to join the British army.

SUIT OPENS. Newark, N. J., June 22.—The Celluloid Company, manufacturers of moving picture films to-day began suit in the United States district court here against the Eastman Kodak Company to recover approximately \$15,000,000 for alleged infringements of its patent rights on a machine for making motion pictures.

ICE BLOCKADE. St. Johns, Nf., June 23.—The extent of the ice blockade along the Northern Newfoundland and Labrador coasts was emphasized by word brought last night by the Steamer Fogata that 500 fishing vessels bound for Labrador had been forced to put into various inlets for shelter.

Fogata had some difficulty in working her way down from the northern coast. The operations of the Newfoundland fishing fleet are seriously hampered.

LAND SALES. Seward, Alaska, June 23.—Sales of town sites along the route of the government railway between Seward and Seward will begin a Ship Creek on July 8, according to an announcement made here to-day from general land office. The lots are to be auctioned to the highest bidder with no limitations as to the number sold to anyone buyer.

The instructions stipulate that the minimum price for single lots shall be \$25. No gambling, liquor selling, nor immorality will be allowed on any of the lots under penalty of forfeiture.

## OTTAWA TO KEEP OUT, SAYS PRESS

Manitoba Capable of Handling Her Own Housecleaning.

By Special Wire to the Courier. Winnipeg, June 23.—The Free Press (Liberal), commenting on the new charges and especially on the demand made by the Telegram for a commission appointed at Ottawa, editorially says that help from Ottawa is not needed, and that Manitoba is capable of doing her own housecleaning, without turning over the job to a new commission, in whose appointment Hon. Robert Rogers would have a hand. As to the part of Mr. Fullerton, the Free Press says:

"When Mr. Fullerton bobbed up before the Royal Commission with his little speech as representative and spokesman of those incorruptible patriots, the fourteen private members, but he represents him and his interests just the same."

In another editorial the Free Press says that more and more attention is being attracted by the part played by the Canadian Northern Railway in the drama. After saying that the C. N. SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS. THE sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency (but not Sub-Agency), on certain conditions. Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within limits of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where homestead is performed in the vicinity. In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$300 per acre. Duties—Six months residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent; also 50 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions. A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$300 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$300. The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions. W. W.
