# ACTING PREMIER

Hon. Dr. Pyne Will Consult Imperial Authorities About Hospital.

Toronto, June 23 .- Hon. Dr. Pyne Minister of Eudcation, leaves to-day en route to England, where he will consult with the Imperial authorities in connection with the proposal o the Ontario Government to establish a war hspital in England. He goes n pursuance of the decision of the Cabinet that in order to give effect most expeditiously to the wishes o the people of Ontario, a responsible representative of the Government should consult with the Army Council and be on the spot to determin 00 exactly what action should be taken to obtain the best resulth.

The Minister's stay will be an in-definite one. Upon his conference with the Imperial authorities will depend largely whether he will return after discussing the matter thoroughly and passing up plans for construc-tion and equipment or will remain a longer period to take part in the initial organization work. The fact that the Ontario Government's offer was broadly made left, of course, a large number of matters within its bounds that had to be threshed out. SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS. THE sole head of a family, or any male

over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency (but not Sub-Agency), on certain conditions. Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre.

53.00 per acre.

Duties—Six months residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent; also 50 acres extra cultivation. Preemption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions.

A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$300.

The area of cultivation is subject to re-
