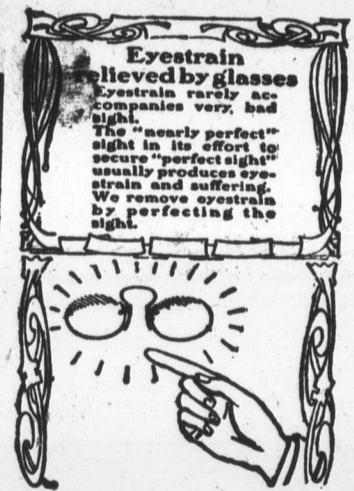

A disease which the veterinarians call typhoid influenza, is causing the death of a large number of horses in the Kingston district, particularly on Wolfe Island, where 70 per cent of the cases have proved fatal.

The performance of "Old Invinible" at the fire on Wednesday demonstrated once more the fact that with plenty of water it is capable of rendering valuable service; but notwithstanding this we presume a considerable portion of the village will continue to procrastinate in the matter of providing tanks.

The problem of draining that section of the village lying west of Elgin and south of Wellington to Main street, presented to the council at its session last week, is one that should be solved at once. While it is within the power of any of the parties interested to initiate proceedings along legal lines to secure a remedy for the evil and a proper apportionment of the cost of the work, it is not unreasonable that they should join in asking the council to assist in effecting an equitable settlement of the matter. While the council could not use general funds for draining private property, it is just possible that in this case the responsibility for drainage extends over a wider area of the village than at first glance would be apparent, and all the facts in relation to the case should be at once established. If it would be possible to carry the water around the corner of Wellington and George streets, that would probably be the simplest way of overcoming the difficulty, but other ways, apparently feasible, have been suggested for carrying for the water, and a committee of interested citizens and representatives of the council would no doubt be able to determine and decide upon an effective course. It is, of course, apparent that if any relief is to be afforded next spring, action must be taken immediately.
