N. H. Stevens Pays Very High Tribute to the Ability and Work of Late Chief.

In speaking this morning of the sad demise of Chief of Police Wm. Young, N. H. Stevens, of the Canada Flour Mills Co., said:—

"I have known Mr. Young since about 1875 and sat in the Town Council with him in 1884. He was an excellent councillor, careful about every detail, and nothing passed without, in his judgment, it was to the best interests of the town.

"I have known him during his whole career as Chief of Police. He was a man I admired very much for his sterling qualities. He was strictly honorable, and while severe against law-breakers, he was very just, and a whole-hearted and kind-hearted gentleman, doing everything within his power to put down vice of all kinds.

There is no doubt that a great deal of the credit for the high moral standard of the city to-day is due to the efforts of the deceased Chief of Police.

In the death of Mr. Young the city has met with a great loss.

"We are flying our flag at half mast, and hope all others will follow the example."

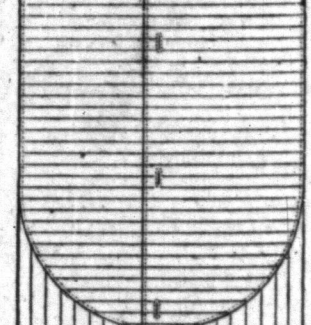
