They included in their amendment a provision requiring that the Berlin Foreign office should not reduce their tariff rates by any treaty arrangement with any foreign power.

### DAY'S DESPATCHES

#### QUEEN'S DAUGHTER ILL.

London, April 10.—Princess Henry of Battenberg, youngest daughter of the late Queen Victoria, is indisposed.

#### NEW GERMAN BATTLESHIPS.

Berlin, April 10.—The Navy Department has made contracts with the Vulkan and Germania shipyards for two battleships, each 13,000 tons displacement, which must be ready for service by 1906.

#### ONLY COLONIAL PREMIERS.

London, April 10.—In the House of Commons this afternoon, Mr. Arthur Balfour stated that the conference of colonial premiers, to be held at the time of the coronation, will be confined to representatives of the British Empire. For that reason the government did not intend to invite Mr. Hay, the American Secretary of State, or statesmen from any other foreign power.

#### PHIL ARMOUR'S MILLIONS.

Chicago, Ill., April 10.—The total valuation of the late Phil. D. Armour's estate, in Chicago, and New York, has just been arrived at. It amounts to \$14,751,105, and to a large extent consists of personal property. In addition to the above-named sum, there is some real estate in Illinois and elsewhere, the value of which is not given. Mr. Armour left practically all of his estate to his widow, Malvina, and his son, J. Ogden Armour.
