Lottie Blair Parker's picturesque and red-blooded drama of rural life in New England appropriately entitled "Way Down East," was splendidly ed "Way Down East," was splendidly presented at the Grand last night. It has been before the public about nine years, and has gained a place in popular, esteem \scarcely second to that held by "The Old Homestead." Although Mrs. Parker is credited with the authorship of it, it is a fact that essential features of it are the work of Joseph R. Gismer, who is given a place on the bills as the person who "produced and elaborated" it. Originally it had only nine characters—Anna, Kate, MaBartlett, the Squire, Martha, the Professor, David, Hi Holler, and Sanderson. Now there are twenty characters. The first person Mr. Gismer introduced in his scheme of elaboration was Seth Holcomb, Marthe's persistent suitor, and inventor of those precious long-life bitters. He was regarded as a necessary complement to the vinegary old maid and neighborhood scandalmonger. Before the advent of Seth there was no logical significance in the existence of Martha Perkins. She began nowhere and ended with as little definiteness, being used merely as the medium of communicating knowledge of Anna Moore's supposed disgrace to the Bartletts. Next Mr. Gismer created Rube Whipple, the town constable, for the purpose of illuminating the resented at the Grand last night Bartletts. The manner in which the play is staged is realistic without being destructive of illusion or idealism. The lifestock does not seem to be lugged in neck and crop for the mere sake of motion, and the two interiors at the Bartlett home are as beautiful and suggestive domestic pictures as can be found in anvbody's play. The entire structure is composed of good material, and it is presented by the actors in a direct and convincing spirit of naturalness and simplicity.
