Tambov, Russia, Sept. 25.—Prefect of Police Tomushan of Borissogliebsk, the home of Mile. Marie Spiridonovo, who shot and killed Chief of the Sewho saret and affice the terms of the coret Police Luzhenoffsky, was fired at and seriously wounded in a street here yesterday by terrorists, who also shot the prefect's wife and two guards, who were accompanying them.
