The work has been going on rapidly in the Woolford, Kimball and Aetna districts, and possibly twenty-five percent of the wheat is in.

Good progress has also been made at Glenwood and Hill Spring. In the hill country west it is slower and of course a much less acreage is sown.

OIL DEVELOPMENTS

Last week we received a call from one of our farmers friends of the Twin Butte country south of Pincher Creek, and it is evident that we are just on the eve of great developments in the oil industry.

The Imperial Oil company have two wells in the Pincher Creek country which are in the locality of shallow drilling. No. 1 well is down some 2500 feet and No. 2 which is closer to the Twin Butte district is down about 1600 feet. These wells are about eight miles apart, and No. 2 is almost due west of us in Section 16-2-29, located

on Pine Creek. The No. 1 well is nearer Yarrow Creek. From the information received there are strong probabilities of the No. 2 well bringing in oil before many days. On the 17th, instant gas was encountered that had a strong flow, and upon being piped out a safe distance for igniting, gave a very fine demonstration of the use it would be for fuel or lighting.

This well is reported as being in the black oil sands and on the 24th inst, was sending up a heavy wet gas that the driller Mr. Snyder, stated intimated the near approach

of the drill to the crude oil that means so much to any country when obtained in paying quantities.

For being the best located field in the south on account of the erosion of the ages removing so much of the covering, the country south of Pincher Creek has always been esteemed one of the coming oil producing districts of Alberta.

We are certainly going to hear of great developments this year as to petroleum and its products.

The well on the St. Mary's River, south of Cardston, is also down

to such a depth that we may expect to hear of good news any day, and we certainly feel that if ever one deserved success in his endeavors, it is Mr. H. H. Cutler and his associates who have expended such large sums in their earnest endeavors to find our mineral wealth.

The news from the J. J. Galbraith ranch is also very encouraging as to developments in that locality. The Montana people are pursuing very ardently the "oil trail" and we are looking to 1921 for the greatest development of our mineral resources that this corner of Alberta has ever seen.
