An explanation was made by the Hon. Dr. J. W. Armstrong, who said that there are increased costs of Mothers' Allowance, Health and increased overhead expense in regard to debentures Of the annual levy, 1 1-2 mills yielding \$1,020,000 was for supplementary revenue purposes. The need for increased revenue was as great on the part of the Government as it has been found in private undertakings, stated Dr. Armstrong.

The speaker did not know when the levy would stop, but he believed that the peak of prices had been reached. He would not hazard a guess as to when the cost decline would commence however.
