TELEGRAPHS AND TELEPHONES BACK TO OWNERS

American Government Will Return Telegraph, Telephone and Cable Systems.

Washington, April 29.—President Wilson has approved Postmaster General Burslem's recommendation that the telegraph and telephone systems of the United States be returned to their owners upon the enactment of legislation deemed necessary and that the American cable lines be restored to their owners forthwith.

The President's approval was announced in a cablegram today to the White House. Mr. Burslem stated yesterday that he hoped to effect the return of the cables by May 10.

Members of Congress today were informally discussing legislation which will be necessary before the land systems can be turned back to their owners. No legislation will be required in the case of the cable lines, it was said, as the affairs of the companies are in such shape that they can take care of themselves.

As the telegraph and telephone lines must be returned in the same physical condition in which they were when taken over, officials pointed out it will be necessary for Congress to enact laws providing financial protection, as to surrender them now without provision for additional revenue would mean the wrecking of the industry. Early action by Congress is looked for, as speedy return to private ownership of the wire service was repeatedly sought at the last session.


