Mr. Ames' Charges of Land Blanketing by Speculators.

Supplies for Hudson's Bay Expedition.

Mr. Brodeur Says Sickness Had to be Provided For.

Ottawa, May 11.—The debate instituted by Mr. Ames on the alleged blanketing of lands in the Northwest was resumed to-day and continued until 9.30 this evening, when it quietly lapsed and the House went into Committee of Supply.

Before the orders of the day were called, Mr. Bourassa rose to make a correction of a remark he had made in his speech on Wednesday on the indemnity bill.

Mr. Emmerson called attention to an editorial paragraph in the Globe saying that if he had been correctly reported as saying the Dominion Government considered taking jurisdiction over the coming conference with the Provisional Governments.

Mr. Bennett criticized the expenditure for supplies in connection with the trip of the Arctic to Hudson's Bay, in comparison with which he said Robinson Crusoe pined away for three years.

Mr. Brodeur said the purchases were made by Captain Bernier who had procured into the supplies purchased for previous expeditions. It was thought the purchases were made by Bernier.

Mr. Brodeur did not see the reason for the purchases when men were starting on an expedition into the northern wilds. There needed to be stimulants in case any of the men fell sick.

Mr. Brodeur declared that it was necessary to take the precaution of Canadian territory and put down illegal whisky and smuggling. He pointed out that Captain Bernier's expedition to the north was asked for by several Conservative members.

Mr. McCarthy pointed out that Conservative members as well as Liberals had endorsed Captain Bernier's trip to the north. That officer was lauded then as the right man to fit out and conduct the expedition.

TENDERS ACCEPTED AT MEETING HELD YESTERDAY AFTERNOON.

The City Engineer's figures in three cases were lower and in one case higher than the accepted tender. His tender for the King street sewer was \$1.75.

George Hayes, to connect houses Nos. 308, 309, 310 and 312 Barton street east with the East avenue sewer.

The Chairman read a resolution of the Board of Health calling upon the Council to construct a sewer system in the east end annex. He said action would be taken.

The committee decided to meet next Friday afternoon and go on a tour of inspection, particularly of the disposal works.


Mr. Brodeur replied that there were some articles brought back. They would be used in the next expedition.

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PRESTON AND JURY QUARREL.

LIVELY TIMES AMONG THE IMMIGRATION OFFICIALS.

Travelling Expenses—Question of Railway Fares—Did Not Like Jury's Letter.

Ottawa, May 11.—A return relating to the squabbles between Mr. W. T. R. Preston on the one hand, and Messrs. Griffith and Just of the High Commissioner's office, and Mr. Alfred Jury, emigration agent at Liverpool, on the other, was tabled to-day.

It is alleged that Messrs. Griffith and Jury, and a Mr. Thomas Duncan, who is not now in the service, were charging first-class fares whenever they travelled, and only paying second or third-class. This led to an order issued from Ottawa forbidding the practice under penalty of immediate dismissal.

Mr. Preston, in his letter, stated that he was aware all along of what had been done, but in a moment of pique stopped his first-class fares and ordered him to travel third, which he refused to do.

Mr. Preston was asked to establish the fact that he had no funds, and also to recoup me the money that I have to give to distressed Canadians who are calling at the office at the rate of two or three a day.

Mr. Preston was highly indignant on account of this letter. He wrote to the department, drawing attention to the charges contained in Mr. Jury's communication, and asked for his dismissal.

ADOPTING PROHIBITION. One More Vote Will Carry All Prince Edward Island. Charlottetown, P. E. I., May 11.—The plebiscite taken in King's county resulted in a vote of eight to one in favor of repealing the Scott act and thereby introducing prohibition, which comes automatically into force, according to the provincial statute.
