THE LATEST IN ALFALFA

The old joke is a classic, that the man fed alfalfa to everything on the place, including the hired girl. But alfalfa has to take a place back in the farthest corner of the back fifty when alfalfa comes along.

Alfalfa boosters are read enthusiasts; they have fed it as hay and they have fed it ground up as a meal—but the hired girl could not get on it at all; it was only for the stock. Now we are to have the chance of eating alfalfa, it seems, just the same as boney does. An alfalfa flour has been produced in Colorado, and, blended with wheat flour, is used in cooking.

Food classes in the Colorado Agricultural College have been working with the seed and have had very satisfactory results, substituting alfalfa for wheat flour in muffins, biscuits, bread and cake. There is a slight characteristic flavor that is objectionable to some people, but in most cases it is a very satisfactory substitute.

London, May 29—(The amending bill to the British North America Act, which extends the life of the Canadian parliament for a year, and which passed the House of Commons almost unnoticed, as a conscientious measure, will come before the House of Lords on Tuesday.

TO KILL FLIES IN HOUSES

Mix two tablespoonfuls (one ounce) of 40 per cent. formalin with one quart (16 ounces) of equal parts of milk and water. This mixture should be exposed in shallow plates with a piece of bread placed in the centre on which the flies alight and feed. By an early and active campaign of fly destruction, great inroads may be made upon this pest, and many valuable lives may be saved.—Conservation.

Kent-Northumberland Sons of Temperance Hold a Successful Convention at Harcourt—A Mem- bership of 723 Reported

The 42nd quarterly session of Kent-Northumberland District Division, Sons of Temperance, organized September, 1905, met in Harcourt Temperance Hall, May 24th. D. W. P.'s report The D.W.P. reported the temperance cause moving on satisfactorily or the whole. Still the British Empire as compared with Russia and France, had cause to be ashamed. Britain had not awakened as she should or as she would have to win the war. In America there was great progress. A number of states had lately gone dry, and the prospects of a saloonless U. S. A. were good. New Brunswick had one of the best prohibition acts to be found in Canada. In license counties it will not be effective until May next, but in Scott Act counties it comes into effect as soon as the Scott Act is repealed. Kings county is preparing to move for repeal at once. On the whole, temperance workers have no cause to feel discouraged. Prohibition was now one of the most popular questions of the day. Our country was waking up as never before, and he hoped soon to see it saloonless.

The D. W. P.'s report was received and adopted.

Net gain of 29 during quarter. The Divisions at Chatham, New Jersey and Centre Napan continue dormant, and that of Millerton has not reported. The enforcement of the C. T. A. in Newcastle under Inspector W. H. Finley continues to improve. Since our last district division, several very large seizures of liquor have been made, and most of the convictions appealed to the supreme court have been decided in the Temperance people's favor, and the rest are under consideration by the Judges, none having been lost. The Newcastle town elections last month, which went by acclamation, again resulted in favor of strict enforcement of all laws against the liquor traffic, and the prospects of the illegal liquor seller in Newcastle are daily proving darker.

The Newcastle Town Improvement League, a strong temperance organization, in the founding of which the

work done by the Sons of Temperance had no little influence, is now in its second year, and is doing good work, not only along temperance lines, but in every other department of civic affairs. It has not directly affiliated with the Dominion Alliance but has endorsed the latter, and guaranteed the closest co-operation with it.

Nearly everywhere we notice a growing tendency to frown upon the liquor traffic and actively assist in, or at least willingly agree to, its destruction. The enactment of a provincial prohibitory law, to take effect on May 1st next, is a distinct step in advance. It is to be hoped that the clauses permitting the keeping of large quantities of intoxicants on hand by druggists and doctors, and the facility with which beer licenses may be secured will not be allowed to become means of defeating the effective enforcement of the new act.

The fact that no investigation into the dismissal of Geo. N. Clarke of Rexton from the position of Liquor License Inspector for Kent County, some time ago, has yet been granted, should make the temperance people watch most carefully the enforcement of all laws against the powerful liquor interests. It is one thing to secure the placing of a good law on the statute books. It is often a quite different matter to secure its honest enforcement. The best law will be killed by bad enforcement if its friends are not eternally awake in its support.

The District Scribe's report was received and handed to the committee on the State of the Order. The following committees were appointed:

State of the Order—L. J. Wathen, H. J. Smith, Miss F. M. Anderson, Miss Adams, L. N. Atkinson and H. H. Stuart.

Report on State of the Order

The following report of the committee on the state of the order was adopted, section by section, and as a whole.

1—We find the statistical report of the District Scribe correct as read, showing an adult membership of 581 and juvenile 142—total 723, a net gain of 29 members during the year.

2—We would again urge every Division to do all it can to organize a Band of Hope in its vicinity.

3—We rejoice to note that the Local Legislature has at last passed a prohibitory law for the province to take effect in license counties on May 1st next, and in Scott Act counties, as soon as those counties see fit to repeal the Scott Act, and we would urge the temperance people to so complete their organization as to make sure of the most beneficial enforcement of the new act. It is the opinion of your committee that those districts in the province now under the Scott Act would do well to have that act repealed and thus come under the Provincial Prohibitory Act, on or before May first next.

4—We recognize the great value of the work done by the Dominion Temperance Alliance and urge upon our Temperance workers the advisability of organizing local branches of said Alliance and assisting it in every way possible.

5—We regret exceedingly that the local government has not yet seen its way clear to grant an investigation into the dismissal "for cause" of George N. Clarke from the position of Liquor License Inspector for Kent County, and again express our disapproval of the continued silence of the Government in this matter. Submitted in L. P. & F. (Sgd. L. J.
