OTTAWA advices of Monday, say: There was a meeting of the Cabinet on Saturday and although nothing was given out regarding dissolution or holding another ses sion, there does not appear to be any doubt now but Parliament will be called at an early date and the general election will be postponed till early next summer. This is the best information available at present time, however, and the Premier has not spoken and there is nothing certain. During the present week a ministerial statement is expected. From this it will be seen that the Government seem to be in an exceedingly uncertain frame of mind regarding the dissolution of Parliament and submitting themselves to the verdict of the people. If the Government, a short time ago, did seriously contemplate bringing on the elections, it could be for no other purpose than to obtain, if possible, a snap verdict before the people became fully aroused to the extent and enormity of their political iniquity and if now they have receded from that determination it is only porary suppression of the courts. the stage and the chairman stated because they have found out the people are ready for them, or because the schemes they depended on to carry the elections have failed, or for both these reasons.
