FIVE PEOPLE BURNED TO DEATH IN SASKATOON

Fire in West End Shack of Myrtalious Origin, Wipes Out One Whole Family and Two Members of Another—What Prevented Family From Escaping from House is Unknown.

Saskatoon, Jan. 14.—As the result of an early morning fire here no less than five persons lie cold in death, while a sixth is so badly burned that it is doubtful if he will recover.

Mystery Surrounds Origin

There is much mystery as to the origin of the conflagration, but it is supposed to have been caused by a coal stove becoming overheated and setting fire to the woodwork of the building.

Winnipeg, Jan. 14.—Fire broke out in the Tribune office at 7 o'clock this morning and although the Tribune plant did not suffer greatly several tons met with losses.
